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PREFACE

Assumption College, Changanacherry, founded in 1950, is one of the leading colleges for women in Kerala and enjoys a rare social accreditation in recognition of her earnest efforts to impart value based education while upgrading herself constantly to address the ever changing demands of the educational sector. In 1997, we were honoured by the Government of Kerala with the **R Shankar Award** for the **Best Non -Special Grade College** in the State. Starting with 358 women students, the College, today, has a student strength of 1928, 102 teachers and 44 support staff. In 2009-10, we celebrated our Diamond Jubilee. **The College was reaccredited with 'A' Grade by NAAC in 2007**.

Since 1997, our faculty has designed four academic programmes under the UGC scheme for Innovative Programmes in emerging areas, both in the Arts and Science streams. With only a single postgraduate programme in Science in the aided stream, the College was able to get a major funding from DST for improvement of teaching and research in the Science departments, thus opening up the prospect of a Research Centre in Science.

In academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, Assumption has steadily maintained her position in the forefront with laurels of victory in the form of university ranks, prizes in cultural pursuits and numerous medals and trophies in the field of sports and games. In 2011, our alumna, Sindhu M T qualified for the IES.

Chithra K Soman, who represented India twice at the Olympic Games, set a record of being the first college student from India (she was our student then) to participate in the Games; she was awarded the prestigious Arjuna Award in 2008. It is also a matter of pride that Assumption College has produced 39 international athletes and players. In recognition of our achievements in sports and games, we were honoured with the first award for the Best College in Sports and Games instituted by the Kerala Sports Council in 2001. She is also a five- time winner of the Rajiv Gandhi Gold Trophy for overall championship in the College Games and eight-time winner of Malayala Manorama Trophy for the Champion College in the University.

Though the majority of students are from within the State, we have a good number of students from other states, as well as NRI students and an overseas student. The seven hostels attached to the College provide comfortable accommodation to 850 students. The criteria for admissions, curricular transaction and welfare schemes are designed to provide inclusive education to students from all categories. There are various clubs and department associations functioning under the Students' Union to foster students' interests and talents in various fields, conduct competitions within the College and impart training to students to develop their skills. With a view to train students in responsible citizenship, active units of Catholic Students Movement, National Service Scheme, National Cadet Corps, Youth Red Cross, Human Rights Cell and Women's Cell function in the College. Students join hands with the Citizen's Forum, municipal bodies and NGOs to participate in programmes of public concern and interest. Linkages and collaborations have been established with reputed institutions and agencies for teaching - learning, research, internship and extension.

Awareness campaigns on energy conservation, environmental issues, solid waste management and eco friendly living are held under the initiative of the various departments. The students actively participate in the municipality's *Green City campaigns*. Many of the hostels have developed innovative and effective techniques for recycling and disposal of solid waste. Livestock are reared and methods of organic farming including vermicomposting ensure safe and sustainable co-existence with nature.

Keeping in view the changing role and greater social responsibility of an educational institution in the new century, the College introduced, in 2003, **Open NSS**, a novel scheme to engage all students in extension activity.

Archbishop Powathil Assumption Community College (APACC), an extension wing of Assumption College is the means through which Assumption reaches out to the specific needs of the community. The Community College carries out both academic and vocational training programmes for local women and students. APACC co-ordinates the extension programmes of the various departments in the College and the incomegenerating activities of the local women. The most recent milestone in the eight-year history of the Community College is the establishment of a Business Incubation Centre for Women which promotes women entrepreneurs who wish to launch or expand their enterprises. APACC works in unison with local Panchayat and Municipal authorities as well as with civil society initiatives. It is also a recognized centre of 'Akshaya', a programme under the State IT mission. The Community College, the first one of its kind in the State, was referred to in glowing terms as the Jewel in the crown of Assumption by the NAAC peer team in 2007.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Assumption College was established by the Archdiocese of Changanacherry to offer higher education to the young women of Central Travancore, but as the College moves into its sixty third year she is proud to cater to the educational needs of women from all over the State and beyond. The College went in for the first accreditation by NAAC in 1999 and for the reacreditation in 2007. It was a matter of gratification for us that from the three star rating in the first cycle, the College was able to rise to an A grade in 2007. We do feel that, as we present the College for the third cycle of reaccreditation, we are able to record quite a few outstanding achievements to our credit, beyond the commendable strides we have made in all spheres of activity. The united effort put in by the Management, staff and students has been blessed with remarkable support from alumnae, parents and the community to raise the College to its current status. Each milestone is an occasion for us to renew our commitment to stakeholders, without compromising on the vision of the founders.

A brief outline of the activities of the College recorded criteria wise in the Self Study Report is given below:

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

Assumption College is a First Grade College offering 16 undergraduate and 7 postgraduate programmes. A Research Centre attached to the Department of History started functioning in 2008, soon after the reaccreditation in 2007. We have also introduced a number of value added Add on, diploma and certificate courses as well as a variety of short term enrichment programmes designed by our faculty which enable students to acquire additional skills by the time they complete their first degrees. The introduction of Choice Based Credit and Semester System in 2010 by the University, offers the College greater flexibility in offering elective and open courses at the undergraduate level. Credit Semester System was introduced for Postgraduate programmes also in 2012. In an attempt to overcome the limitations of the affiliatory system, the College has tied up with other agencies to offer more flexibility and diversity in its academic programmes – it offered UG and PG courses under the Off campus stream of the University until 2009, was a partner institute of IGNOU under the convergence scheme from 2009 onwards and is a sub- centre of the Department of Continuing Education of the Government of Kerala. New academic programmes, like Masters' in Textiles and Fashion are introduced considering feedback of students and other stakeholders. The Community College, a subsidiary wing of the College offers a variety of programmes for skill development open to students and women of the Community.

Teachers are actively involved in curriculum design and development of the affiliating University as they are members of academic bodies and subject experts of curriculum revision committees of UG/PG. Above 80% of the faculty participated in the workshops on curriculum revision prior to the introduction of the Choice Based Credit and Semester System. The Institution has always fostered a collaborative network with the university, research bodies and industry to further curriculum design, for higher studies and research and for internships and placements. The goals and objectives of the College are integrated into the academic curriculum as much as possible to ensure that expected learning outcomes are attained.

TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Transparency is ensured in the admission process at all stages. Until 2011, prior to the introduction of Central Allotment Process by the University, the College used specialized software for admission procedures. The social, economic and geographical profile of the applicants is considered in admissions to seats under community merit and management quota. Good results, campus discipline and general atmosphere conducive to learning may be taken as justification for the uniformly high demand ratios for all programmes. Teaching methods are adapted according to the needs of students. Training programmes are arranged for teachers within and outside the campus to improve the quality of teaching-learning. Remedial coaching, Bridge courses, Peer group learning and Tutorial sessions are aimed to help slow learners while advanced learners are motivated through multiple intelligence skills. Special attention is given to the physically challenged, economically and socially weaker students. The enrichment modules offered by all departments to supplement the regular curriculum, aim for skill development/ employment and empowerment. In 2009 AIACHE recognized this system with **P.S Job Award for the Best Innovative Programme**.

Increasing opportunities for fieldwork, internship and practical experience enable students to learn from firsthand experience and prepare them for future careers. Regular mentoring and counselling help students to improve their academic performance and psycho-social levels.

Twenty seven teachers have M. Phil and twenty have PhD as their highest qualification. In addition to ten books edited/compiled, there have been thirty nine international publications, thirty national publications and forty nine papers in International/national proceedings by faculty members since the last reaccreditation. The Management is keen to recruit meritorious candidates and thirteen teachers appointed in the last few years have qualified from reputed institutions. **Dr. Paulami Aich Mukherjee**, who joined the department of History in 2012, is the sole **Cultural Ambassador of the Government of Portugal** in India.

An efficient system of continuous internal assessment has been introduced; the register for internal assessment and the **Open NSS Learning Journal** are effective means of evaluating and recording students' performance. A structured system for student assessment of teachers and Teachers' work dairy are methods for appraisal and improvement of teacher's performance. The academic calendar and the action plan prepared at the end of each year ensure the smooth conduct of all activities of the following year. Academic audit, both internal and external, are conducted on a regular basis under the initiative of the IQAC.

The College library, which has a collection of more than 63, 000 volumes, subscribes to 135 national and international research journals and provides access to e-journals /e-books through INFLIBNET. ICT facilities including Teleclassroom and virtual lab facility are used for curriculum transaction. The institution takes the initiative to arrange national and international programmes for the staff and students to enable them to keep up with the latest developments in their fields. Students get ample opportunities to interact with eminent academicians/scientists who visit the campus. The Department of Fashion Technology avails the services of experienced industrial experts from **Senior Expert Service (SES)**, **Germany**, to train students to keep up with international standards.

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Many departments are in the process of mobilizing research activity. All departments are engaged in informal research and the department of History is a Research centre with six research guides and five scholars. Nine teachers have been recognized with awards for excellence in research and two are reviewers for international journals. Five major projects and nineteen minor projects have been taken up by the faculty in the post reaccreditation period. **Dr. I'ma Neerakal** was recognized as **Women Achiever in Science by KSCSTE**, Government of Kerala (2012). **Dr. Binumol Abraham won Gold medal and award for Best Thesis** from the **University of Hyderabad** (2012). **Dr. Paulami Aich Mukherjee** was selected as the **youngest scholar to submit Ph.D thesis** in the faculty of Arts (2010) from Jadavpur, Kolkata; she was also distinguished with the **Best Lecturer Award** for 3 consecutive years from **Asiatic Society Kolkata** (2009- 2011).

A major fillip for research activity in the College is the **funding of 67** lakhs sanctioned for the development of infrastructure for teaching and research in the Science departments under FIST programme 2012 of the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India. Inspire Science Internship Camp funded by DST was organized in the College in 2012 to attract youngsters into pursuing pure sciences.

Along with pure research there is also a thrust on research as an extension activity to link the campus with the community. Forty members of

the faculty are consultants/resource persons to various agencies while the College provides consultancy services in twenty four different areas. A major initiative in community-oriented research has been taken by way of student surveys of an interdisciplinary nature, sponsored projects, tie-ups and linkages with external agencies.

The Archaeological Survey of India, National Museum, New Delhi, UNICEF, SEWA, Kerala Chamber of Commerce, Kerala Folklore Academy etc. are some of the organizations with which collaborations have been effected. The College became a Training Partner Institution of the State Government's Additional Skill Development Programme to offer training in communication skills and soft skills for graduates and postgraduates from all over the State.

Archbishop Powathil Assumption Community College has completed eight years of service in the field of women empowerment and community oriented activities. It is designed in accordance with the recommendations of the National Policy of Education and the UGC with a view to finding a remedy for the lack of social commitment in higher education. APACC aims to generate employment among the unreached sectors of the community through tie ups with governmental as well as non governmental organizations. Following a tie up with the **Federation of Indian** Women Entrepreneurs (FIWE) the Community College launched the South Chapter of the Federation in 2013. Another major milestone in extension is the establishment of Assumption Business Incubation Centre for Women which opens a doorway to provide technical skills for women entrepreneurs. It provides them a platform to work hand in hand with national and international women organizations. AWAKE, an umbrella organization that coordinates the entrepreneurial initiatives to develop a professional marketing network is also a noteworthy achievement.

Students are trained in good citizenship through organizations like NCC, NSS, Youth Red Cross, and also through extension activities of the departments and clubs. Our NSS units were recognized as one of the best in the University, **Ms. Whyni Gopi** was selected as **Best Programme Officer and Rachana Renukumar as Best Volunteer** in 2011- 2012. Our NCC Officer, **Ms. Kamakshy V was awarded the Most Promising Officer Medal** at the NCC Training Academy, Gwalior in 2013.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The College offers excellent infrastructure facilities for curricular and extracurricular activities. The Research Centre in History, Assumption Heritage Museum, an indoor auditorium, a seminar Hall, DTP Centre, hostel for PG students, Student Amenity Centre with Recreation Room and Counseling Centre, renovation of the Auditorium, conference halls, departments, administrative offices, and laboratories and Basket Ball/Volley

Ball Court are among the major infrastructure developments in recent years. The canteen, cafeteria and College store are open during working hours. Two College buses cater to the needs of day scholars from interior areas.

New books and journals in the General and department libraries, INFLIBNET/Smart Board/Tele Class Rooms/and virtual lab, broadband connection and Wi-Fi, are some of the learning resources that help faculty and students to keep pace with the latest developments in their fields. LAN facility is available within the whole campus. A major investment in infrastructure was the **installation of a transformer** exclusively for the campus. Regular maintenance and upgradation ensure smooth and effective functioning of equipments/ instruments.

The **seven hostels** attached to the College offer comfortable accommodation for more than 880 students while residential teachers stay in the staff quarters.

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

A vast majority of our students hail from backward areas and belong to average and low socio-economic categories. The College helps them to overcome such limitations by offering a variety of welfare schemes like freeships, financial aid, incentives and scholarships for achievers. Other than Central, State and University Scholarships, the College has instituted 98 scholarships in claboration with other agencies, considering both merit and means. The Mentor care programmes, the department of Human Resource Development, Counseling Centre, Career Guidance and Placement Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell provide support services and facilities to students. Book Bank facility, micro finance plan - "Samridhi"- and noon meal scheme are some of the ways in which needy students are supported. Special attention and scholarships are given to sports students of the college. The Community College enables students to take short term skill development courses and has the support facilities to promote the entrepreneurial skills of students.

The College emphasizes institutional social responsibility by trying to inculcate in students attitudes of social commitment and a concern for the less privileged. The College won the **district level award** for the college from which **most number of students donated blood** (2011-12). Students take the initiative in arranging charity visits, fund raising, collection of lunch packets/clothes for the needy and tuitions for underprivileged school children. They also give demonstration of experiments for school children of the neighbouring schools. Keeping in sight the vision of the College, value education is incorporated into the routine of the College. The Catholic Students Movement arranges annual retreats and intercollegiate spiritual animation camps for catholic students.

The College has a track record of covetable achievements in cultural and literary fields. In the last year, **92 prizes** were won by students in intercollegiate competitions. **NCC Cadet Aleena Johnson** was selected for **Youth Exchange Programme in Sri Lanka (2012)** and three cadets participated in the Republic Day Parade at New Delhi this year.

A total of **1683 medals and 211trophies** were bagged in sports and games by our sportswomen during 2007-12. That **eleven students represented the country** in the last five years and **won seven international medals** is a matter of great pride to us. The Kerala Sports Council has deputed 3 full time coaches on campus in recognition of our outstanding performance in sports and games.

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The administrative mechanism ensures transparency, flexibility and innovation in keeping with changing needs and contexts. The smooth functioning of the College at both the academic and administrative levels is ensured by statutory bodies as well as advisory bodies. The organogram of the College indicates its clear-cut structure of organization which has continued through the years. Continued cooperation and understanding among the top management, Principal, faculty, administrative staff and other stakeholders contribute to the planning and streamlining of institutional policies. Meetings and discussions among the various bodies ensure maximum participation and coordination of all units in all the important decisions taken. A fair degree of operational autonomy guarantees decentralized governance. Leadership is groomed at various levels by allotting directorship of associations/coordination of committees to faculty and by involving them in administration. Student leaders and representatives are members of committees at various levels.

Through Participatory Departmental Appraisal (PDA) by students, campus evaluation by student representatives, self appraisal of teachers, departmental SWOC analysis by IQAC and periodical internal quality checks by management, to maintain academic and administrative standards. Institutional relationship with stakeholders is improved through regular feedback. Each year a particular area is identified as the thrust area for development and input sessions, action plans, project proposals etc. are made to sensitize and equip the student community to "think globally and act locally". To improve the infrastructure facilities of the College we tap and ensure optimal utilization of resources available from different sources such as government, UGC and self-funded courses. Provisions for inclusive education are made considering the socio demographic profile of our students. Annual internal and external auditing guarantees financial transparency.

INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

All the activities of the College are oriented towards her vision and mission. Faculty development programmes and training programmes for students aim at excellence in academics. Efforts are made to instill in students an awareness of the dignity of womanhood and to enable them to practice sustainable development through eco-friendly activities. Activities of the College Union and departmental associations help students to develop social consciousness, responsible freedom and self reliance, promoting a healthy corporate life among them.

'Going green' starts with little things and technology selection is based on women-friendly and cost effective methods such as vermicomposting, segregation of waste at source and preparation of biopesticides, to name a few. The areas of ecological intervention taken up by the College include energy conservation, management of solid and liquid waste, and water conservation methods for soil enrichment. Numerous awareness camps and action campaigns are conducted to sensitize students on eco-practices that protect the environment. The Nature Club of the College and different departments take the lead in organizing such programmes. The Nature Club of the College was awarded the "National Environmental Award" instituted by Khadi and Village Industries in 2008.

The College encourages students to maintain a vegetable garden inside the campus. Organic fertilizers, vegetable seeds and saplings are distributed among students to prompt them to grow the crops in their homes. Effective team work and positive involvement of stakeholders contribute towards the development of the College.

Major innovations introduced in the last five years are:

SWOC ANALYSIS

Strengths

- The College has an excellent reputation as one of the leading women's colleges in the state and the oldest in Central Travancore.
- Members of the Managing Board include eminent and experienced academicians and administrators who put in pertinent suggestions for quality improvement.
- Though the College is owned by the Archdiocese of Changanacherry, it has complete autonomy in financial matters. The income generated internally is fully utilized for improvement of services/ facilities.
- Competent faculty are appointed solely on the basis of merit.
- The College maintains an atmosphere of discipline, conducive to learning. Free from party politics, elections to the Students' Union are conducted in the parliamentary mode.
- In conformity to the vision of the founders the College takes care to uphold the noblest Christian ideals and spares no effort to impart value based education.
- The College is blessed with dedicated faculty who spend extra time outside the regular syllabus in engaging value education sessions, tutorial hours, remedial coaching and mentoring.
- The College provides opportunity for skill development through short term Enrichment modules, soft skills training through the HR department and psycho social guidance through the Counselling Cell.
- Eco friendly living and socially responsible citizenship is inculcated in students through the routine activities of the NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross, the different departments and clubs.
- The Institution has good infrastructure facilities and learning resources, which are enhanced and upgraded regularly.
- There are ample opportunities for ICT enabled teaching learning as the College has 20 LCDs, 212 computers in LAN network with 24 hour internet connectivity.
- A unique feature of the College is the residential facility it offers to students through the seven hostels, attached to the College. A college bus provides easy access to students from the rural Kuttanad area.

• The best training and support facilities are extended to sports students. The are six full time coaches of which three are deputed by the Sports Council of Kerala to train our students.

- The campus has uninterrupted supply of water and electricity as well as intercom facilities.
- Strong and continuing networking with alumnae, parents and retired faculty through their respective organizations helps the institution to receive feedback for quality improvement from stakeholders at different levels.
- Cordial relations are maintained among staff, students and non teaching staff which contributes to an atmosphere of cooperation and goodwill.

Weaknesses

- According to the policy of the State government, new academic programmes have not been sanctioned in the aided stream for the last ten years. Hence the College is forced to start unaided courses for which lack of permanent faculty is a serious problem. At times there is also the non availability of efficient faculty.
- The campus area is limited and there is little scope for future expansion in this direction as it is located in a residential area.
- Since there is a predominance in the number of undergraduate courses the College has comparatively less scope and facility for research.
- In the current scenario it is increasingly difficult to ensure the security of women students when sending them for internships and training programmes outside the State.
- The College is situated in a semi urban area and this makes it difficult to effect industry linkages required for new generation job oriented programmes.

Opportunities

- Support from the alumnae and benefactors enable the College to give a good number of scholarships and freeships to students especially on merit cum means basis.
- An increasing number of teachers have acquired research degrees and undertaken research projects, so there is improved scope for upgrading more departments to the status of research centres.

• The College being affiliated to the University and recognized by the UGC it is eligible to apply for development grants and UGC sponsored programmes.

- Since the College enjoys a good reputation, students get opportunities for placement and internship in premier institutions.
- The College uses internal resources to provide scholarships, freeships, fee concessions and other welfare schemes for financially backward students, thus affording them the opportunity to continue their studies.
- Assumption being a women's college, we have every opportunity to focus on the holistic development of women students.
- Since the College is free from party politics and has a tradition of discipline, there is no disruption of classes due to strikes etc. Therefore it is possible to adhere to the academic calendar drawn up at the beginning of the year.
- The College offers a variety of courses offering chances for higher education, research, employment and entrepreneurship for all categories of women students

Challenges

- The University switched to the Choice Based Credit and Semester System in 2010 and the number of working days we get are totally inadequate to complete the prescribed curriculum. To make up for this, all departments take extra sessions on Saturdays and holidays thus putting too much pressure on teachers and students.
- Since Centralized Allotment was introduced by the University, there is undue delay in completing the admission process in the PG programmes. This results in lack of adequate time to complete the syllabus which is very vast.
- There is delay to make appointments in substantive vacancies, as the Government takes time to grant concurrence for the appointment of teaching and non teaching staff. In the meantime, the management is forced to appoint temporary staff. This affects the smooth functioning of the academic and administrative systems and proves to be a drain on the financial resources of the College. Also the permitted number of appointments with regard to support staff is far less than the necessary number and the management has to appoint a large number of support staff on daily wage basis.
- Lack of autonomy, which is in accordance with Government policy, is a serious challenge as the College has to function within the constraints of an affiliated college

- Since the demand ratio for all courses is uniformly high, the College is forced to admit students beyond the permitted strength through requesting the University for Additional Seats. The infrastructure and resources of the College are sometimes rather inadequate to meet the needs of increased number of students.
- In a scenario where the number of professional colleges in the State has increased inordinately, the quality of students who join for the conventional degree courses is far below the required standard. Equipping them to keep up with the demands of advanced syllabuses is a serious challenge.

Future Plans

- To apply for new PG programmes and job oriented UG programmes.
- To apply for UG programme in Physical Education
- To start more multidisciplinary/interdepartmental programmes.
- It is proposed to construct a new block to accommodate classrooms and allied facilities for new programmes.
- It is hoped that the proposed Instrumentation Centre sponsored by DST, will cater to the research requirements of scholars and researchers from other institutions.
- To build a Sports Complex incorporating a roofed Volleyball court, multipurpose synthetic court and Long Jump runway, dormitory for visiting teams/ campers and guest residence
- To effect linkages with international fashion schools for student /faculty exchange programmes
- The Business Incubation Centre for Women launched at the Community College is projected as an institute to train prospective women entrepreneurs and to assist them in setting up their own ventures. Starting with a garment construction unit, the Centre will incubate other business enterprises in the near future.

CRITERION I

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

Vision, Mission and Objectives of the Institution

Vision

• To maintain the highest academic standards upholding the noblest Christian ideals and moral values to create enlightened, empowered and socially committed women.

Mission

- To equip students with skills which make them globally competent.
- To create a research culture and instill a devotion to academics.
- To encourage higher education among the economically weak and socially backward sections of the community, irrespective of caste and creed
- To create an awareness of the dignity of womanhood and help students to develop an integrated personality.
- To contribute to the sustainable development process.
- To create socially productive citizens.

Objectives

- Start innovative courses related to frontier areas so as to equip women students to meet contemporary requirements of society.
- Introduce modern technology in teaching-learning as well as governance with an aim to further improve the academic and administrative functions of the institution.
- Facilitate institution-community interaction.
- Identify thrust areas for each year to translate different aspects of the vision and mission of the college into its routine activities.

The goals and objectives of the College are communicated to the students and stakeholders mainly through the college calendar, the prospectus, website, occasional meetings with stakeholders and also through newspaper supplements brought out on special occasions of the College. Efforts are made to help students to assimilate them through the regular activities, awareness programmes and instructions.

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Action Plan for:

a. Curriculum Development

The Staff Council and IQAC meet for two consecutive days at the end of each year to assess the academic activities of the College, and suggestions for improvement are noted. At the beginning of the next year, meetings are held to draw up an academic calendar based on these suggestions. Each department presents its action plan in the staff meeting at the beginning of the academic year. Feedback from stakeholders is also considered during this stage.

For the effective implementation of the schedule, various committees are constituted for formulation of the general academic timetable and methods to record attendance, designing of teacher's work diary, conduct of internal and external examinations, operation of grievance redressal etc. Monthly planners and lesson plans are drawn up by individual teachers for effective transaction of university curriculum. The internal examinations are conducted according to the academic calendar and parent-teacher meetings are organized to discuss the performance of the student. Tutorial hours are utilized to help slow learners and extra classes are arranged so that the syllabus may be completed well in time.

b. Curriculum Transaction

The University conducts workshops in curriculum development in which teachers from all departments participate. It also deputes resource persons to the College for the effective conduct of workshops on curriculum development and transaction. The institution organizes subject-wise workshops and expert lectures on revised curricula, utilizing the facilities offered by the State Higher Education Council and the University. Teachers are encouraged to participate in such programmes conducted by other institutions and they have published handbooks and study materials for effective curriculum transaction. The College gives them ample opportunities to improve their teaching practices through training in ICT and specialized software. All departments have LCDs and computers with access to internet and INFLIBNET, as well as books and other learning resources. Learning hours and tutorial sessions are held in addition to the regular working hours, to enhance curriculum delivery.

Teachers' work diary helps them to plan lessons so as to ensure timely completion of syllabus. Above all, the College provides an ambience conducive to teaching-learning.

Networking with External Bodies

Departments of Fashion Technology, English, History, Zoology, Home Science, Computer Science, Commerce and Social Work have networks with about 40 firms and industries as part of the requirements of the curriculum.

BA Museology and Archaeology students collaborate with Kerala Council for Historical Research and the Department of Archaeology, Government of Kerala in the excavations of archaeological sites. The Department of Home Science maintains links with different agencies such as Interdisciplinary Institute for Research and Training (IIRT), Directorate of Industries and Commerce of the State government, multi-speciality hospitals within and outside the State, and star hotels for research, training, extension and internship programmes. Social Work students have block placements in organizations which lead on to placements. In the curriculum based final collection presentation of students of Fashion Technology, designers and representatives from industries are invited.

Institutional Contribution to Curriculum Development

The University started the Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) for UG in 2009-2010 and Credit Semester System (CSS) for PG in 2012-13 as a major innovation. Above 80 percent of teachers from UG and PG departments participated in the Curriculum Design and Revision workshops. At present five teachers are members of the Board of Studies of Mahatma Gandhi University, and three of Kannur, Calicut and Avinashalingam Universities. From 2005 to 2009, we had sixteen teachers on the Board of Studies and three of our teachers are expert committee members of various curriculum boards. Seven teachers are members of examination boards of other universities within and outside the State. Teachers who have been members in the sub-committees for curriculum revision have prepared model question papers for the university. They have authored prescribed textbooks as well as handbooks and laboratory manuals to complement the curriculum.

The College has taken the initiative to start courses which are not offered in other institutions. Priority was given to the requirements of the industry, opportunities for research and chances for employment. For courses like BA in Communicative English, BA in Museology and Archaeology and Bachelor of Fashion Technology (BFT), the curriculum was designed and modified by our faculty. Our faculty prepared syllabi for all Add on courses, Enrichment modules as well as for Diploma in Fashion Designing, Diploma in Office Administration and Secretarial Practice, PG Diploma in Journalism and PGDCA offered by the Community College.

Since no post graduate course is available in the State for Fashion Technology and this discipline offers scope for research, we started MSc in Textiles and Fashion. When new courses are applied for, committees comprising Principal, Head of the Department, Course coordinator and faculty of the subject concerned, with the help of external experts/consultants, take the initiative to design the syllabus. Institutions which offer similar courses within/outside the state are visited for the purpose of setting up laboratories etc. For instance, a number of museums such as National Museum, New Delhi and Dutch Palace, Mattancherry were visited before establishing the

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Assumption Heritage Museum; and laboratories and other infrastructure of NIFT, Bangalore were taken as models for starting Bachelor of Fashion Technology and Master's in Textiles and Fashion.

Institutional Measures to Analyze the Achievement of the Stated Objectives of the Curriculum

The effectiveness of the way curriculum implemented is analyzed through evaluation and feedback from stakeholders, including prospective employers in firms where on-the-job trainings are arranged for students. Feedback on internships and practical training such as excavation expeditions and field trips help to analyze students' progress. Value added ICT sessions are given to all students to ensure that they are able to keep up with the requirements of the curriculum. Placement records of previous batches are also evaluated to bring about necessary changes.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

The College offers 6 PG and 16 UG courses in the aided/self financed streams and 1 PG programme which is a UGC sponsored Innovative Interdisciplinary Teaching and Research Programme. In addition to these, skill development short term courses and career oriented add on courses are also conducted. From 2009 to 2012, as Partner Institute under the convergence scheme of Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU), UG, PG and Certificate courses were offered. The College was an Off-campus Centre of Mahatma Gandhi University till 2009.

Self-financed Programmes- Admission, Curriculum, Fee Structure

The self-financed courses are regular full-time programmes. There is no difference in the curriculum of the aided and unaided programmes of the University. Through a formal selection procedure, the College appoints well qualified lecturers on contract basis, considering their credentials and experience. Pay scale of the faculty varies from Rs 8,000/- to Rs 18,000/- with yearly increment according to qualification, experience and the nature of the subject.

Elective Options, Lateral and Vertical Mobility

In the current system, there is no provision to combine the conventional UG and distance mode courses. However, according to current stipulations of the University, the College is expected to choose an elective course for each UG programme. Colleges have the flexibility to change the elective courses at the beginning of the academic year. Students are free to opt for an open course of their choice out of the 17 courses the College offers. They can also take up projects of their choice as part of the programme. From among the range of choice based courses offered by the University, the College has chosen the open courses and electives considering students' skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability/entrepreneurship.

Academic Flexibility Offered by the College

During the course of their study, students may undergo any of the career oriented Add on courses of the UGC, the interdisciplinary Enrichment modules offered by the various departments and skill oriented courses of the Community College.

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There is a provision for students who shift to another college/university within the State during the course of their programme to continue their studies without any break. Students who have completed their degree programmes with a pass in Common Courses (languages) need not repeat them if they take admission to another UG programme in the same University. Transcripts issued to students after completion of their programmes in the College, ensure weightage in their respective disciplines, when they continue their higher studies abroad.

Students are permitted readmission following sick leave, maternity leave etc. NRI students are permitted leave for purposes of visa renewal. Students who have Teacher Training Certificate (TTC) are allowed to take up employment as teachers in leave vacancies so that they may not forego their claim to future appointment. Those students who are awaiting results of supplementary exams at the plus 2 level can join diploma/ certificate courses at the Community College before gaining admission to the degree courses on merit basis.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Institutional Initiatives

The College focuses on a thrust area each year related to its goals and objectives. The students are involved in activities organized in connection with the thrust areas. Since the curricula of all UG programmes include ICT modules, extra preparatory training for this is given to all students. To bridge the gap between the Higher Secondary syllabus and the UG programmes, the following departments offer Bridge Courses: English, Malayalam, Mathematics, Computer Science, Commerce, Fashion Technology and Economics. The Management has appointed a full time teacher in French to take classes during regular working hours for students who have taken French as additional language so that they do not have to go for classes outside the college. Classes in German language are also arranged for faculty and students of the Fashion Technology Department. To enhance language competency of students, training in communication skills is imparted to students on a regular basis. Coaching in mathematical skills and for competitive exams are offered and the Add on courses help students to improve their knowledge in their disciplines.

Open Courses are selected and Enrichment Modules are designed in such a way as to relate to students' experiences. Students are encouraged to take up projects that aim to enrich the curriculum and cater to the needs of the employment market. Seminars and assignments are allotted so as to enable students to go beyond the curriculum. Students are taken on field trips, industrial visits, and deputed for internships to prestigious firms and organizations. The Department of Human Resource Development imparts training in soft skills and allied areas to equip students to gain employment.

Integration of Cross cutting Issues into the Curriculum

The Open Courses opted by the College for the UG programme include Gender Studies, Environmental Chemistry, Energy and Environmental Studies, Environmental Economics and Environmental History in Indian Context, Internet, Web Designing and Cyber laws, Nutrition, Community Health and Sanitation, Physical Health and Life Skills Education. The Social Work Department runs a Foundation Course in Human Rights, sponsored by the UGC. Seminars on topics such as Environment Issues, Green Chemistry, Agri-based Micro Enterprises, Intellectual Property Rights, Gender Sensitization, Women Empowerment, Budget Evaluation etc are arranged to supplement the curriculum prescribed by the University.

Value added Programmes for Holistic Development

Weekly value education sessions are arranged to inculcate moral and ethical values in students. Value based talks are arranged frequently for all students. Annual retreats, camps, life guidance programmes, talks and competitions are organized by the Catholic Students Movement – an organization meant for the spiritual animation and holistic development of catholic students. In addition to these, special sessions are organized for inmates of the College hostels.

English language skills are imparted to students of all disciplines through short term courses and the Open Course in English for Careers. Courses in Applicable Mathematics and Business Ethics and many of the academic programmes conducted by the Community College are meant to provide students with better career options. There is a full time HR trainer and a Career and Placement Cell and language lab in the College to help students develop their soft skills and employability skills. The College is also a training partner for the State Government's Additional Skill Acquisition Programme which aims to impart communication skills and soft skill training to outgoing students to improve their chances of employment. Talks and presentations on cross cutting and ethical issues such as health and medical issues, waste management, importance of organ donation, dignity of human life etc are conducted for the whole college. Students take tuitions for children in a local orphanage and a nearby colony. The Certificate Course in Human Rights offered by the Social Work Department is aimed to inculcate community orientation in students. Courses conducted by APACC, especially for students and women of the locality, aim at community development.

Evaluation of Quality of Enrichment Programme

The Enrichment programmes are evaluated through feedback from students, faculty and parents. Value added programmes are offered on issues of contemporary relevance. There is a committee to monitor the attendance, conduct of classes and evaluation of the Enrichment modules of all departments.

1.4 Feedback System

Impact of Feedback on Introduction of New Programmes and Enrichment of Curriculum

The IQAC collects feedback from students and stakeholders regarding the curriculum. The results are communicated to the respective departments and teachers present the required modifications in the University's workshops on curriculum revision. Where changes are not implemented, the curriculum is internally supplemented through bridge courses and extra modules.

New academic programmes like MSc in Textiles and Fashion (MTF), additional Add on courses, teleclassroom and virtual lab facilities were started based on stakeholder feedback. MTF was started in 2012 based on need assessment as there is great demand for the PG programme which is not offered anywhere in the State. In keeping with the government policy of emphasis on skill development along with regular academic programmes, the College started enrichment programmes and Add on Courses of the UGC. The courses were selected in response to student feed back and requirement. One new Foundation Course under Human Rights Education Scheme of the UGC was also introduced in 2011-12 to create awareness on human rights and inculcate human values among the youth.

The open course of UG programme in Economics was changed in keeping with the request from students and current trends in the field. *Nanoscience and Nanotechnology* was opted as the elective paper of BSc Physics Programme since it is an emerging area for research. Open Course of UG programme in Commerce was changed from Business Ethics to Fundamentals of Accounting. The elective options for MSc and BSc Computer Science are changed according to latest technology tools. In view of the demand for UG and PG programmes in Commerce and Computer Science, the College introduced these courses under the off campus stream of the University. Following the winding up of this system in aided colleges, we introduced these courses under the convergence scheme of IGNOU. Subsequent to the change in policy regarding partner institutes, the College has applied for these programmes in the self-financing stream.

The effectiveness of the way curriculum is implemented is analyzed through evaluation and feedback from stakeholders, including prospective employers in firms where on-the-job trainings are arranged for students. Feedback on internships and practical training such as excavation expeditions and field trips help to analyze students' progress. Value added ICT sessions are given to all students to ensure that they are able to keep up with the requirements of the curriculum. Placement records of previous batches are also evaluated to bring about necessary changes.

The Principal and IQAC coordinator participated in the interactive session of stakeholders on "Restructuring of undergraduate" education and the

scheme of cluster of colleges" organized by the University in 2007. In 2009-10 the University introduced the CBCSS system in the affiliated colleges with a major restructuring of curriculum at the UG level. Feedback on semesterisation, collected from students and faculty was analyzed by the Departments, IQAC and Staff Council and communicated to the University.

CRITERION II

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

Admission - Publicity, Transparency, Criteria and Process

The College, which follows the regulations of Mahatma Gandhi University in receiving applications and publication of the merit list, publicizes the notification in regional dailies, the college website and notice board. It contains detailed information about the academic programmes offered, eligibility, admission process, etc. The prospectus of the College gives all the details about the programmes including fee structure and other aspects related to the admission process.

Until 2011, prior to the introduction of Centralized Allotment Process (CAP) by the University, the College used specialized software for computerizing the admission process. There is a General Admission Committee as well as separate department committees to prepare the admission lists. Allocation of seats is as per University rules.

The merit list for admissions under management quota is prepared giving weightage to the social, economic and geographical profile of the applicants. For unaided programmes 50% of the seats come under open merit and 50% under management quota, which is filled in the same manner as for aided courses. Lists prepared according to the above norms are displayed on the College notice boards and uploaded on the College website.

From 2011-2012 onwards, admissions to the UG programme have been by CAP. The applications are received by the university through online registration. Selection and admission of applicants to the merit seats and SC/ST quotas are done wholly by the University. The other quotas are filled by the College as was done prior to CAP.

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For the self-financing courses, Bachelor's in Fashion Technology, Master's in Textiles and Fashion and Master's in Social Work, the University conducts common entrance tests for admission to merit seats. For the 50% to be admitted under management quota, aptitude tests are conducted by the College. Students who qualify for admission are called for a personal interview with parent in the departments concerned and their talents and interests are recorded.

Scholars who have cleared the University's qualifying test are eligible for admission to Ph D programme in History.

From 2002-2009, the college was an Off Campus Centre of the University for BBA, BCA, BCom and MCA, with no restrictions in admission. The College functioned as a partner institute for full-time BBA, BCom, MCom, MBA and MCA courses offered by IGNOU from 2009-2012. For these, admissions were conducted according to the criteria of IGNOU.

The Community College which functions like an Open School, offers a number of vocational courses including those under the Continuing Education Programme of the State Government, Keltron and courses funded by NABARD with much more lenient admission criteria with the purpose of catering to the needs of different categories of women.

Marks at Entry Level

Since the number of applications received for most of the UG courses is quite high, the minimum percentage of marks for admission is higher than in the nearby colleges.

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Student Profile Reflecting National Commitment to Diversity and Inclusion

Student profiles are collected at the time of admissions. The data is categorized in the office and handed over to respective mentors. The format for recording profiles is revised according to necessity. Review of student profiles helps in understanding students' background and in collection of data regarding students in various categories. Admission policies are adopted by the Managing Board depending on year wise admission profiles. When a fall in student strength for UG courses is noticed for certain subjects, awareness campaigns are conducted in neighbouring schools and science departments conduct programmes for school students to attract them to the basic sciences. Minority communities are given preference for admissions in management quota to make up for the fall in their numbers in certain years. Fee concessions, book bank facility, free notebooks, dress allowance, free noon meals, freeships are provided to economically backward students. The College bus service was started to provide convenient transport for students from rural Kuttanad area. Meritorious sports women are also granted financial assistance. The Equal Opportunity Cell in the College ensures that scholarships and concessions are availed by deserving students.

Demand Ratio across the Programmes Offered

The demand ratio for admissions to the various courses is high compared to that in other colleges in the district. In the last few years the general trend observed is an increase in the number of enrolments for basic sciences.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

Addressing the Needs of the Differently Abled

Special attention is given to differently abled students in the Institution. A PTA meeting of physically challenged students is conducted in the beginning of the year to get an idea about their wards' difficulties and needs. Extra private coaching is given to blind and deaf students. Special chairs, tables and other infrastructure facilities are made available and UGC funds are procured for them. In relevant cases, reports and data are sent to the University. The University sanctions a scribe and grants extra time for these students during University examinations.

Assessment of Knowledge and Skills at Entry Level and Strategies Adopted to Bridge Knowledge Gap

For the newly admitted students, the College conducts a three-day orientation, called the Induction programme, before the commencement of the teaching programme.

The Induction programme, common to all disciplines, is a way to assess the skills and knowledge levels of the freshers. Freshers are familiarized with the campus facilities through activity oriented games. A database of the newly admitted students is collected by each department.

The science departments adopt special procedures like familiarization with scientific terms and laboratory equipments for filling the knowledge gap between students coming from different streams of Plus Two like CBSE, ICSE and State syllabus. To improve practical skills, demonstration classes are given to fill the gap. Additional time of half to one hour is allotted to such students in necessary cases.

Departments offering programmes requiring basic language skills, basic mathematical skills and technical knowledge conduct Bridge Courses for students who are new to the particular discipline. Bridge courses with

structured syllabuses are conducted by the departments of Fashion Technology, Commerce, English, History, Malayalam, Mathematics, and Computer Science. The departments of Social Work and Fashion Technology conduct special induction programmes for their students. Additional computer sessions have been made mandatory for all freshers as the restructured syllabus of all disciplines demand basic computer knowledge.

Sensitization of Staff and Students on Cross Cutting Issues

Social issues are discussed by students on a regular basis in their Open Forum. The staff association's *Dimensions* is a platform for teachers to share their views on contemporary issues as well as the inputs they receive through seminars and conferences. Important days related to Environment and Gender awareness, Health and Lifestyle are observed in the college under the initiative of the various departments and clubs. Wildlife Week and Ozone day are observed by the Nature Club by conducting a number of programmes like awareness campaigns and rallies. The College has made a documentary on environmental concerns and the Library stocks documentaries dealing with such issues. Staff and students have joined together to make the campus plastic free by collection of plastic carry bags and bottles for recycling. The Botany Department has a vermireactor for the production of vermicompost. The importance of energy conservation is conveyed to students through awareness campaigns and the annual quiz competition conducted by the State Electricity Board. The PTA took the initiative to procure MP fund for setting up a solar power plant in the campus. The fund has been sanctioned for the year 2013-14. All departments have voluntarily implemented different ecoprojects within the campus. For gender sensitization, an Open course in Gender Studies has been opted for by the College and students spread awareness on gender issues through street plays etc. An Equal Opportunity Cell functioning in the College endeavors to internalize inclusive practices in the College and the MSW Department conducted an international seminar on Inclusion and a 30 day gender sensitization programme Jagrithi was conducted by the Department in 2012-2013 in view of the increasing incidence of crimes against women. Kalalayajyothi, an awareness programme on gender rights and helpline services for women was organized by the Chemistry department under direction from the UGC. Dr Prameela Devi, member of Vanitha Commission, led the session in which students from neighbouring schools also participated. Two workshops, on Promotion of Ethics and Human Values were conducted, with funding from the UGC.

Encouragement to Advanced Learners

The College identifies advanced learners by means of database of students, induction programme and tests at the beginning of the course. The first and second internal tests, both theory and practical, which are a part of continuous internal assessment, help in evaluating the caliber of the students.

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The methods used by various departments for categorizing the students include group discussions whereby the analytical skills and group dynamics of the students can be evaluated, and seminars, where the students' presentation skills can be assessed. The writing skills of students are developed by conducting book and article reviews. Assignments, paper presentations, model classes by students, quiz competitions, monthly test papers, and debates are other strategies adopted for identifying advanced learners. The hostels which accommodate about 850 students have their own literary, cultural and extension/charity programmes for which the inmates take full responsibility.

Advanced learners are encouraged to undergo coaching for competitive examinations, involve themselves in diverse club activities, participate in seminars, workshops, and competitions within and outside the College, to be volunteers and organizers in the various programmes conducted in the College. They are given regular HR training and career orientation programmes. The HR Department conducted a training programme in public speaking, certified by Creek International, for advanced learners who gave public presentations of their oratorical skills. The **CORALS** programme (Core Group of Advanced Learners), with multi level selection and testing procedures, spread over three years, is meant to identify and explore the abilities of promising students to explore their potential to the maximum extent. Outstanding luminaries are felicitated and awarded in a public meeting. A gold medal, instituted by an alumna, is presented to the **Best Outgoing Allrounder**. University Rankholders are recognized by displaying their photographs on notice boards and banners in the campus.

Measures Adopted to Reduce Drop-out Rates of Students

Data regarding students' academic performance is collected through internal evaluation tests and output in the Remedial and Tutorial sessions. Students' overall performance is also monitored by the Head of the department, mentor, class teacher and hostel wardens (if applicable). Personal attention is given to students through academic counselling, individual meeting with parents and house visits by teachers. Slow learners are given remedial coaching and tutorial sessions to catch up with their peers. Soft copies of question banks are maintained in the electronic session to help students to prepare for examinations. Students from economically and socially backward sections are given free hostel accommodation and fee concessions in many cases.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

Teaching, Learning and Evaluation Schedules

The teaching programmes are scheduled as per the University's academic calendar. IQAC and Staff Council chalk out the year's programmes including routine activities, intercollegiate events, seminars and internal evaluation schedules. An academic calendar is prepared and distributed to the students and teachers at the beginning of every academic year. Each department prepares its action plan for the year. The teachers also have work diaries which include entries such as curricular and extracurricular work done and monthly planners. An evaluation of the work diaries is done by the Heads of the Departments and forwarded to the Principal at the end of each term. Individual internal assessment register is maintained by each teacher to record the academic progress of the students on a continuous basis.

Contributions of the IQAC to Teaching-learning

The IOAC works towards enhancing the teaching – learning standards of the Institution. Every year, at the time of submitting the AQAR, an academic audit of the departments is conducted by the IQAC with regard to overall performance. In its annual conclave, the Cell puts forward suggestions for sustenance and improvement of quality. AMoCE (Academic Monitoring Cell for Excellence), a subsidiary wing of the IQAC, conducts a systematic annual student evaluation of teachers and the results are handed over to the teachers through the Principal and the heads of the Departments. Self appraisal of teachers was carried out under the initiative of the IQAC to enable teachers to identify their strengths and areas for improvement. The IQAC members visit reputed institutions to learn about best practices and also to familiarize themselves with new learning resources and infrastructure. The Cell takes the initiative to conduct orientations and workshops to enhance the personal and professional effectiveness of teachers. The introduction of suitable new academic programmes, work diary and internal assessment register of teachers, question bank CDs in the library and the structured process for selection of best outgoing students were some of the recommendations of the IQAC. The Cell collects and reviews the list of equipments and learning resources required by each department and proposes to the UGC/recommends to the management the purchase of the same. The IQAC is represented in the Planning Board which draws up the long term plans for college development. The IQAC motivates more teachers to avail of the FDP and to take up research projects. The Cell collects feedback on the College from students, alumni and PTA in an effort to keep up with the expectations of stakeholders.

Support Systems for Teachers to Promote Student-centric Learning

The needs of advanced learners and slow learners are addressed differently. Advanced learners are encouraged to help their weaker classmates. Group study is practiced outside class hours. UG students act as instructors

when they organize science camps and demonstration sessions for school students. Students take the lead to organize seminars, quiz programmes, speech and essay writing competitions and exhibitions which help to increase their knowledge and skills. The College provides facilities for student activities during weekends and holidays. They are encouraged to make maximum use of the library which is open beyond the working hours of the college. The electronic section offers free access to online sources. Students are prompted to utilize Open Educational Resources for their assignments, seminars and projects. They are also provided with virtual lab facilities. Students of many departments prepare manuscript magazines which promote their literary talents and creativity.

Infrastructural facilities are available for ICT based teaching – learning on a regular basis. The College also encourages departments to organize motivational sessions for students, availing the services of expert resource persons. The HR wing and individual departments conduct add-on courses and short term enrichment modules to impart and enhance the life skills of students. Computer courses make them eligible and fit for short term jobs. A Communication Skills programme is run on an ongoing basis to improve students' English – speaking skills. Students display their literary and artistic talents and newspaper cuttings on their department **wall magazines**. These are assessed once in a month by a committee and prizes are awarded for the best presentation.

Nurturing Critical Thinking, Creativity and Scientific Temper

Brain storming sessions and group discussions are made part of the learning process. The open forum provides a platform for students to think of and voice their opinions on current issues. Student projects/ department projects, Science exhibitions within and outside the campus and visits to research centres nurture a scientific temper in the students. The Students' Union, departmental associations, the various clubs, the College magazine, students' wall magazines, documentaries, campus bulletins and newspapers and campus /community surveys are chances for them to discover and hone their creativity. Students also get opportunities to interact with famous academicians who visit the college.

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Technologies and Facilities for Effective Teaching

Since every department is provided with computer, LCD, printer and Broadband internet connection, faculty and students have access to ICT at all times. The College and hostels have internet accessibility through NME-ICT also. Use of such facilities make students confident in the use of technology and encourage independent learning. Students also are required to conduct ICT presentations. Use of Internet resources is encouraged as part of academics. The College is a nodal centre of Amritha Virtual Lab, an initiative of Ministry of Human Resource Development under the National Mission on Education-ICT. Modern teaching aids like smart boards and digital visualizers are utilized in the College. Certain departments have specialized learning software.

Innovative Teaching Methods

Virtual labs offer simulation facilities before practical sessions. Faculty members develop e-resources in their respective disciplines for the website of the State Higher Education Council. The department of Fashion Technology has the innovative practice of sending students to different parts of the country to research and document ethnic crafts. Students make use of these craftinspired elements into the garments they design for exhibition and fashion shows. This helps students to get an understanding of the little known indigenous crafts/ cultures of India while enhancing their creativity. The Home Science department has incorporated one month on-hands practical training in all aspects of Home Management (Cottage Stay within the campus) into the curriculum of the UG programme. The food fests organized by the DFSM students, quiz programmes, participatory learning activities etc are other innovative teaching-learning methods. The learning experience of UG students are enhanced through the training they impart to school students in the awareness programme- "Experiencing Chemistry"-organized by Chemistry Department. The Physics department organizes workshops in experimental Physics to improve students' practical skills. The feedback obtained as part of student evaluation of teachers is used to encourage faculty to adopt innovative approaches in teaching.

Practical experience, first hand knowledge gained through field trips and use of technology enable students to be proficient in their subject and acquire entrepreneurial skills necessary for presentation and application of what they have learned.

Exposure to Advanced Level of Knowledge and Skills for Students and Faculty

The faculty pursue higher studies and participate in refresher courses, seminars, workshops and conferences to update their knowledge and take up minor and major projects. Papers are presented in international, national and regional seminars. Each department subscribes to academic journals and a

substantial number of books are added to the library annually. Book exhibitions of reputed firms are organized in the campus every year. Journals available in the library, both print and electronic, enable faculty and students to update their knowledge. Students are encouraged to participate and present papers in seminars/workshops and competitions within and outside the College; they are also taken to science exhibitions conducted by premier institutions. They are taken on study tours, field trips and visits to research institutes as part of course work. All departments conduct intercollegiate events annually with a view to help students interact with experts and their peers in other institutions. Students are

Whenever possible the College hosts national and state level seminars/competitions conducted by academic associations. Expert/alumni lectures and seminars are conducted on upcoming areas to familiarize faculty and students with new developments. Two experts in pattern making and textiles from Social Business Women, Germany, serve as visiting faculty in the Department of Fashion Technology.

Academic, Personal and Psycho-social Support and Guidance Services

The faculty take special care in the academic and personal development of every student. A mentoring programme is there, by which 20-30 students are allotted to a mentor. The College conducts orientation sessions for mentors to equip them to conduct mentoring sessions effectively. A special session is allotted every week for mentors to meet their wards in addition to the regular interactions. The faculty in charge of mentoring provides timely help to the students who face problems like poor academic performance, family problems, and relationship problems. Mentors refer students in need of further help to the Counseling Cell.

The College has a fulltime Counselling Cell with two professional counsellors. The students can approach counselors according to their needs. The guidance and counselling cell conducts a general orientation for all students on counselling facilities and encourages students to utilize their capabilities and creativity. The services of experienced and qualified retired teachers are also utilized, whereby students can freely approach them to talk about their problems and be referred to professional counselors when necessary. More than a thousand students benefited from the Counselling Cell in the last two years. It has helped many students to improve their academic performance and cope with their problems.

Library Resources to Augment Teaching-learning

The library is well stocked and new titles are added every year. Students are encouraged to refer available books and journals for their assignments and presentations. An electronic information section in the college library provides INFLIBNET and free internet connectivity and provides facilities for students to view documentaries and CDs of educational

value. Projects and dissertations require students to utilize the reference section. Question banks in electronic form are available for students' reference. Study material for coaching for competitive examinations is also stocked in the library.

Challenges in Completing the Curriculum and Institutional Approaches to Overcome them

Entrance tests and centralized allotment of seats by the affiliating university cause delay in completing the admission process and hence the colleges do not get the stipulated number of working days in a semester. This difficulty is also faced when working days are lost due to unforeseen circumstances such as natural calamities, bandhs and bus strikes. In the newly introduced semester system at the UG level the curriculum is quite advanced. At the entry level students have to be prepared with Bridge courses and introductory lectures because of the disparity in the students' knowledge level and complexity of the curriculum. All departments, therefore, resort to extra classes on Saturdays and holidays to complete the syllabus in time. Since all programmes have computer based courses, freshers are given a foundation course in computers. Use of ICT also helps to simplify teaching of complex topics.

Monitoring and Evaluation of Teaching-learning

The Academic Monitoring Cell for Excellence (AMoCE) conducts a confidential student evaluation of teachers. The filled-in questionnaires are scrutinized computationally and handed over to the Principal. The Principal passes these on to the individual teachers through the head of the department and gives necessary directions to the teachers. This evaluation helps teachers to understand their strengths and weaknesses and helps the Institution to maintain the quality of the academic programmes. Teachers' work diary and monthly planner are also checked by the heads of the departments and Principal.

The learning process is evaluated through internal tests, seminars, assignments viva voce and external examinations. Students of Fashion Technology make a public presentation of their research findings based on their craft documentation module. Students who have internship and OJTs are required to make formal presentations which are evaluated by teachers. Feedback is also collected from employers of firms where students undergo internship.

2.4 Teacher Quality

Details of Faculty Qualification and Strategies for Recruitment and Retention of Staff

Faculty members are selected following government and university norms. For regular courses, where substantive posts are sanctioned by the

government, qualified and competent faculty are appointed as and when required. The management makes it a point to take in meritorious candidates only. In the absence of specialized faculty for unaided courses, the management appoints guest faculty on contract basis. Qualified and efficient faculty are retained with higher pay and stage-wise salary hike. The College welcomes human resources from other institutions to ensure diversity in academic input. For instance, seventeen of the twenty one faculty members appointed in the last five years are from other premier institutions within and outside the State.

Institutional Efforts to Meet the Demand for Qualified Faculty for New Programmes

When new areas of study are introduced teachers participate in workshops and training programmes to update their knowledge. At times such orientation programmes are arranged by the University and other institutions. Teachers also attend Refresher Courses related to their areas. Expert lectures in emerging areas are organized by all departments. As a result many of the faculty members have become proficient in handling specialized areas. Qualified faculty are appointed on contract basis and also invited on part time basis for certain modules in courses like BFT, BA Communicative English, BCom, DFSM, MSc Textiles & Fashion and MSW. Visiting faculty from Senior Expert Services, Germany are engaged for BFT programme. German language classes are arranged for the faculty and students of the department to facilitate exchange of ideas, and further our plans for student/ faculty exchange programme. For self-financed courses such as BFT, BCom with Computer Applications, retired and experienced senior faculty were appointed as visiting faculty and coordinators.

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The College has a track record of producing excellent results with a number of ranks in the university examinations. The demand ratio for all courses is higher than that of most other colleges in the district (refer **Tables** 2.5, 2.13 and 2.14). With international visiting faculty in Fashion Technology, students have the advantage of international exposure that makes them globally competent.

Institutional Policies and Programmes to Enhance Teacher Quality

The Institution takes the initiative to arrange development programmes for the staff to enable them to keep up with the latest developments in their fields. Two international seminars and seven national seminars have been conducted by the different departments in addition to expert lectures and state level seminars/workshops. The Annual conference of the Museums Association of India was organized by the college in collaboration with the Association. The departments that celebrated their golden jubilee organized a number of programmes including seminars, lectures, exhibitions and intercollegiate competitions for students. Dimensions, a programme of the staff association is a platform for teachers to share the knowledge and expertise they have gained from programmes attended outside the college. The Management of the college encourages teachers to pursue part time/full time research, take up more research projects and attend various faculty development programmes like refresher courses, orientation courses, seminars, conferences, symposiums, workshops, etc. They are trained in the use of modern ICT aids to improve teaching methods and are given training in the College computer institute when revised syllabuses require updating of knowledge and skills.

Provision is made for faculty members to concentrate on their research work, produce publications and attend seminars/courses through internal work arrangement. Those who are pursuing research work on part time basis are exempted from extra duties. Salary for substitutes of teacher fellows is at times advanced by the Management to make up for any delay that may happen. Substitutes are also appointed by the Management when the government does not sanction appointments in such posts.

Evaluation of Faculty for Improvement of Teaching-learning

The Academic Monitoring Cell for Excellence (AMoCE) conducts a confidential student evaluation of teachers. This evaluation helps teachers to

understand their strengths and weaknesses and helps the Institution to maintain the quality of its academic programmes. Internal audit of the departments is conducted by the Principal and Manager. The IQAC takes the initiative to conduct internal evaluation of the departments for two consecutive years followed by an external evaluation in the third year. Based on these evaluations and the suggestions offered, all departments draw up their action plan for the following year and submit it to the Principal for approval. As a result of this, a number of new and innovative programmes have been implemented by all the departments.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

Stakeholder Awareness of Evaluation Processes

Since student evaluation is a regular and ongoing process the faculty are familiar with the methods. It is given in the college calendar and teachers' internal evaluation register. If changes are introduced, faculty and students are informed well in advance. Students and parents are briefed about the evaluation process at the time of admissions. Individual teachers give instructions on evaluation and a common orientation is given to students before the first university examination.

Evaluation Reforms by University and Institution

The University introduced the Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) in 2009. Internal evaluation based on tests, assignments and seminars is mandatory. 25% weightage is devoted to internal assessment. The grading system was also introduced.

Committees have been formed at the college level for proper implementation of the CBCSS as well as conduct of internal tests. The committee members attend workshops and orientations on CBCSS conducted by the University. One of our teachers is a member of the University vigilance squad which monitors the conduct of university examinations in the affiliated colleges. The academic calendar of the University is strictly followed with regard to conduct of internal tests and dispatch of internal evaluation mark lists

Examination committees for both external and internal evaluations oversee the conduct of examinations to ensure effective implementation. Internal exams are conducted for all classes on the same dates and there are cut – off dates for submission of mark lists. Students who score less than the required minimum in internal assessment may improve their grades by going through the assessment process once more. Those who are unable to appear for internal examinations due to genuine reasons are given a second chance.

Formative and Summative Evaluation Methods

Students are evaluated on a continuous basis through mandatory internal theory and practical examinations, class tests, assignments, ICT

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enabled seminars and viva-voce. Based on their performance, remedial coaching and tutorial sessions are given to slow learners. Through additional hours, the syllabus is completed as early as possible so as to conduct revisions and extra coaching. Before the university examination model examinations are given to all classes. The marks obtained by students in the two internal examinations are consolidated and displayed on the notice board. Through this, students become aware of their performance levels and concentrate on areas that need improvement so that they can perform better in the university examinations.

Transparency in Evaluation and Mechanisms for Grievance Redressal

The criteria for assessment are percentage of attendance in class, assignments, seminars/viva voce, performance in practical sessions, and internal exams. The Internal exams are conducted as per the pre-published schedule.

At the end of the semester, the results of the internal evaluation are put up on the notice board before they are sent to the University and also uploaded in the college website so that parents can view them. After the internal exams, parents are asked to meet the teachers to discuss the progress of their wards. Internal assessments are compulsory and re-tests are permitted only in genuine cases. Attendance, class participation and punctuality in submitting assignments and projects are also given weightage in internal assessments.

Evaluation is done by all teachers for all courses to assess students' knowledge and skills. Students who have not achieved the learning objectives

are given extra attention through additional coaching and simplified study materials.

The College has provision for a three-level redressal of grievances of the students regarding evaluation. All teachers maintain personal registers designed by the Internal Assessment Committee to record the grades obtained by students in the internal assessments. When the results of the internal assessment are put on the notice board, students are free to approach the teacher in charge and if necessary, the Head of the Department. If the complaints are not resolved satisfactorily, they can bring their grievances before the Grievance Redressal Cell for clarifications. The University offers a provision for further discussion, if grievances are not solved at the college level.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

Strategies of the Institution to Achieve Intended Learning Outcomes

The College aims at enabling students to go on for higher studies or employment. Efforts are also made to equip students with skills that make them globally competent. These projected aims are stated in the mission statement of the college.

The needs of advanced learners and slow learners are addressed differently. Seminars, visits to research centres, lectures and alumni lecture series motivate students towards higher studies and research. Discussions in open forums sensitize students on current developments in their disciplines. All department associations conduct co-curricular activities to increase the knowledge and skill of students. The HR wing and individual departments conduct add-on courses and short term enrichment modules to impart and enhance life skills. Computer courses make them eligible and fit for short term jobs. Career orientation classes and exhibitions open up possible career choices, and placement drives provide opportunities for assessment of learning outcomes.

With a view to empowering women students and providing them with knowledge and skills necessary for global competence, Certificate courses, Add on Courses and Enrichment modules are offered along with regular UG and PG programmes. Open Courses opted by the departments are meant to introduce students into application/job oriented and emerging fields. Seminars on Research Methodology are conducted for PG students to encourage them in pursuing research.

Students are given soft skill training, personality development workshops and training in fostering their talents and leadership traits through various clubs and organizations. The College provides equal access to students from socially backward and economically weak sections of the community. They are given extra attention through remedial coaching and tutorial sessions. The Open NSS scheme helps to integrate personality

development and social commitment into the existing curriculum. Further, the Community College, a subsidiary institution of the College, focuses on imparting vocational training and providing entrepreneurial skills to regular students as well as to the less privileged, drop outs and homemakers. The Business Incubation Centre at the Community College trains and promotes potential women entrepreneurs, especially the alumni of the College. Extension activities like Community Nutrition programmes in neighbouring communities propagate healthy living. Minor projects focusing on women empowerment and society development have been taken up.

Monitoring, Analysis and Planning to Overcome Barriers in Achieving Learning Outcomes

At the time of admissions student database is collected and bridge courses are designed according to the needs of the students. The HR department categorizes students for the purpose of imparting training in soft skills.

Students are evaluated on the basis of internal tests, assignments, seminars, presentations and group discussions. Their performance in the external examinations and placement drives are also assessed. The fact that a majority of students proceed to higher studies/ research/ employment is a positive indication of learning outcomes. Students who need extra attention are given tutorial sessions and remedial classes. To help students face examinations with confidence, soft copies of question banks prepared by the departments are made available in the library. Students are encouraged to use ICT in their learning and presentations and participate in workshops /seminars in their respective disciplines.

Overall learning outcomes, both curricular and extracurricular are recorded through students' self appraisal in their Learning Journals, which are monitored by mentors.

Graduate Attributes of the College and their Attainment by the College

The mission statement of the College focuses on the distinctive feature of the Institution as a women's college committed to the overall development of society through educating women. The College is committed to ensuring empowerment of women by enabling them to be self reliant and attain global competence through necessary knowledge and skills. The College provides every opportunity to develop the organizational abilities of the students. Women, if encouraged to continue into higher levels of education and research, may ensure their participation in policy making and nation building. Majority of our graduate students go in for higher studies, while students who graduate from the new generation courses- BFT and BA Museology Archaeology - are placed without delay.

Since the College is a **minority institution** located in a semi-urban area, social development is attained through educating women students,

irrespective of their caste, creed, economic and social background. **Institutional Excellence Award** by All Kerala Catholic Congress, Archdiocese Committee, for the Meritorious Contributions in the **field of Higher Education** in Kerala

Value based education founded on Christian ideals seeks to instill moral uprightness and good citizenship qualities for the development of integrated personalities. Awareness and practice of sustainable development through eco friendly living has become an inevitable requirement for survival in the modern world and the College aims to inculcate these values in its students.

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

Research Centre

The College has a University recognized research centre in History with approval to conduct course work as part of Ph D programme. Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, has sanctioned Rs 67 lakhs under the FIST-2012 program to facilitate teaching and research in science disciplines. Research centres in the neighbouring college under the same management are utilized by our teachers and students for their research projects.

College Research Promotion Council- Composition and Recommendations

A Research and Publication Promotion Council comprising five faculty members with research experience and aptitude was constituted in 2006 with the following objectives:

- o Step up research activity in the departments and among faculty
- Co -ordinate the Faculty Development Programme of UGC within the college
- o Publish interdisciplinary research journal
- o Start more research oriented programmes

Institutional Measures to Facilitate Research

Since the management extends full support to teachers to acquire higher qualification and competence in their fields, a majority of the teachers who hold research degrees have attained them through FDP. During the post reaccreditation period, seven of our teachers acquired Ph D, five acquired MPhil and **four** have submitted theses for valuation. Of the newly appointed teachers, five have PhD and one has MPhil. Provisions are made by the management for appointing substitutes in vacancies where there are technical objections for payment by the Government. Seed money for publication of College Research Journal is also met by the management. As the College is affiliated to MG University, teachers have the provision to publish research papers in the university's interdisciplinary research journal. Leave, registration fee and travel expenses to attend seminars/ conferences are sanctioned from the College. The Principal Investigator has full autonomy in carrying out research projects and fund transferred into the Principal's account by the funding agency is disbursed to the researcher as soon as possible. The Management carries out required upgradation of infrastructure for new research projects taken up by faculty. For those pursuing part time research, the Institution offers support through work arrangement and exemption from extra curricular duties. Every year provision is made in the management fund for the conduct of national and international seminars and workshops, invited talks, publication of Research Journal, participation of teachers in conferences. running of Research Centre in History and setting up and maintenance of Heritage Museum. Timely auditing for submission of utilization certificates to funding agencies is a regular practice.

Efforts to Develop Research Culture among Staff and Students

Since student research projects are a part of UG and PG curriculum, laboratory facilities and books are available in the departments. The departments of Computer Science, Physics, Fashion Technology, Zoology and Home Science send students to external research centers; the Departments of Physics and History offer facilities for project work of PG students. Students are taken on visits to research centres and industries to motivate them into research. Student projects are at times funded by external agencies. Students of the departments of Physics, Zoology, Botany and Chemistry are involved in the faculty research projects. Paper presentation competitions are organized annually by the departments of Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Home Science, Physics, Economics and English. Botany students conduct exhibition of rare local and endangered medicinal plants and label the trees in the campus for sensitizing students about the importance of conservation of plants. The department of Oriental Languages conducts symposia and paper presentations by faculty and students. The folklore clubs under the Departments of History and Malayalam involve students in research related to local heritage and folklore. Various Departments utilize students' research aptitude and practical skills in conducting exhibitions for local schools. Students of Museology and Archaeology take part in excavation programmes of the Kerala Council for Historical Research. The departments of Economics and Fashion Technology have internal research wings to take up, document and present their research.

Opportunities for Interaction with Eminent Researchers

Conferences, workshops and expert lectures are organized by all departments so that faculty and students get an opportunity to interact with eminent researchers from reputed research centres. Sixteen teachers are members of various professional bodies in their respective discipline. As part of the INSPIRE Science Camp in 2012 eminent scientists and researchers were invited over to interact with students. The Annual Conference of the Museums Association of India was hosted by the College in 2011 in an effort to bring together academicians, researchers, and eminent persons in the field to benefit the faculty, students and local researchers.

Transfer of Research Findings to Students and Community

The Science departments of the College organized a state level INSPIRE Science Camp for school students in which 160 students from 20 different schools participated. The 5 day residential programme was funded by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, to motivate young minds towards research in the basic sciences.

The Botany Department conducts training in mushroom cultivation and provides mushroom spawn for growers. The department also provides training in organic farming and vermi composting. Sale of seedlings of medicinal plants and vegetables is also undertaken. The Home Science department brings out therapeutic recipe booklets and CDs/monographs on lifestyle diseases. The Zoology department practices apiculture and encourages students to practice bee keeping in their homes. Students of the Department of Fashion Technology design garments, drawing inspiration from their research in the indigenous crafts of India. These are exhibited in a fashion show and sometimes rented out to other institutions.

3.2. Resource Mobilization for Research

The Institution is keen to mobilize all available funds for research and allied activities. Grants from UGC, Management funds and from governmental agencies are channelized for research. Major achievements in this direction in 2012-13 have been the launching of a new Innovative Interdisciplinary Research Programme of the UGC (M Sc Textiles and Fashion), the DST sponsored project FIST- 2012 and the sanctioning of four major projects, in science and social science streams.

Financial provisions to support student research projects

The College has set up infrastructure and learning facilities including project laboratories, software, computers and DTP facilities for students to carry out their project work. Faculty assists students to procure available funds for their research projects from external agencies. Two students of the Physics department received funding from DST and KSCSTE to carry out their projects. Financial assistance is provided through the College Welfare Fund for field trips connected to their research projects. Available UGC funds are also disbursed for the same.

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Inter-disciplinary Research

The Folklore club attached to the department of Oriental Languages conducts research surveys on Kerala folklore and folk arts in collaboration with the History Department. Students of BA Communicative English, Chemistry and Physics conduct research on waste management and power consumption practices in the locality to sensitize the residents on eco-friendly practices. A UGC sponsored research project on waste management in Changanacherry was carried out by a faculty member in the Department of Economics and the findings were submitted to the Municipality.

Optimal Use of Equipment and Research Facilities of the Institution

The Research Centre in History and the Heritage Museum encourage students to pursue research in History and Museology. Research guides from other institutions are registered as supervisors at the Research Centre in the College. A well equipped computer centre provides broadband internet connection to help staff and students to access the net outside working hours and on holidays. The library gives free internet facility for students' research projects. Computers with internet facility in all departments, Wi-Fi facility, a well-stocked library, with national and international research journals and INFLIBNET, enable faculty and students to keep up to date in their respective fields. The library is open on holidays and during vacation. Through the proposed FIST sponsored instrumentation centre, the College aims to offer access to sophisticated equipments for researchers in the Science departments. Expensive research equipments are shared by different science departments according to need.

3.5 Consultancy

Institutional Strategies for Establishing Institute-industry Interface and Promotion of Consultancy

The Institution encourages consultancy services by faculty to benefit the local society, the less privileged and for the purpose of women empowerment. Institution- industry interface is promoted through projects, surveys and services. The list of broad areas of consultancy services provided by the institution and the expertise of the faculty are given in the college calendar and website. Besides, expertise in diverse fields is imparted through activities such as training programmes, advisory services and fashion shows. Day to day consultancy services are published through dailies, college website, college notice board, notices and local TV channels.

Encouragement to staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services

Infrastructure facilities of the College are given out for training programmes such as mushroom cultivation and there is also a buy-back policy for the trained. Faculty members are encouraged to offer their expertise in the recruitment of staff in local schools and colleges and also to be judges in interschool and intercollegiate competitions. Most services do not yield regular monetary returns. However, where this is available, the remuneration is utilized for meeting the expenses for providing the service, salary for assistants, for improving the infrastructure and for department activities.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility Institution-Neighborhood-Community Network for Good Citizenship, Service Orientation and Holistic Development of Students

The College encourages student participation in community service by actively involving them in various campaigns and programmes in the adopted colonies, municipal wards, municipality, parish, social service societies, charity homes etc. In conjunction with the municipality and the local residents' associations, students participate in activities to promote clean and green neighbourhood. The Community College is engaged in training local women in income generating enterprises. Home Science students give classes on health awareness and conduct nutrition campaigns in the local panchayats. Some departments and hostels have students engaging free tuition classes for children in a local orphanage. Physics students hold awareness campaigns on energy conservation and MSW students and NSS volunteers organize rural camps for the benefit of the community. Students are involved in relief work for those affected by natural calamities. In connection with the observance of important days like AIDS day, street plays and awareness camps are held in the local community. Facilities of CANCER awareness and detection camp were extended to the neighbourhood also. Blood donation camps and pledging for organ donation is also encouraged. Students of the off Campus courses collaborated with Changanacherry municipality, State Electricity Board and Industrial Estate for social projects on Pollution Control, Scarcity of Water Resources, Mosquito Menace, Energy Conservation and Waste Management. Staff and students join with the Changanacherry Vikasana Samithi in promoting environment awareness campaigns and in developmental activities in the municipal area.

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Legal awareness camps are conducted every year to equip the students with sufficient knowledge of our legal system and to make them law abiding citizens. In order to give a community orientation to the students, they are encouraged to participate actively in fund raising missions of the College. A day's fasting is observed and the fund collected thereby is used for charity purposes. Mission day is observed every year by the College community by organising various fund raising events by the departments and the funds raised are sent to the mission areas. The College also develops in the students a spirit of sharing by encouraging them to contribute meals to 'Puthujeevan Trust' once in a week. The Mother Teresa Award instituted by the PTA is awarded to the best social worker in the College.

Open NSS is an innovative scheme started by the College to include all students in extension activities. It was recognized by the MG University in 2006 with the Award for the most innovative programme under NSS in the University. Without the stipulations of regular NSS, students benefit from outreach programmes and other community oriented activities irrespective of their area of study. It is aimed at engaging all students in community service through community oriented programmes, workshops and personality development programmes which also contribute towards the holistic development of students.

Institutional Mechanism to Track Students' Involvement in Activities which Promote Citizenship Roles

All students are required to maintain a Learning Journal which records all their co- curricular and extra curricular involvements. They are expected to get the entries ratified by their mentors. Students who put in a specified number of hours are given certificates and they are considered for awards. Those who are volunteers in NSS, Youth Red Cross etc are evaluated on the basis of their attendance and performance in social work.

Promotion of Faculty and Student Participation in Extension Activities

Students and faculty are provided opportunities for participation in extension through the active functioning of various organizations like NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross, CSM, Human Rights Cell, Red Ribbon Club and Open NSS. Students are obliged to take membership in at least one of these. At the time of admissions, they are provided with the option of making their choice. Incentives and prizes are given to students who actively participate in the activities and they are recommended to the University for availing of chances to take part in interuniversity camps and programmes. For the award of gold medals and prizes for best outgoing students their involvement in extension activities is a chief criterion.

Teachers take charge as directors for the different service programmes listed in the College calendar each year. There is also active participation in extension through charity activities. The College provides venue for conduct of programmes such as intercollegiate Volunteer Training Camp (2009) and

Anti-ragging campaign organized by the NSS units. Twenty two teachers are currently sponsoring AIDS affected children and about Rs. 5,00,000/- was contributed by them in the last five years towards this cause. Teachers take up duties in connection with the General elections and also when the College is instructed to serve as a venue for renewal of voters' list.

Values and Skills Inculcated through Extension Activities

Students are involved in all the extension activities of the College. They take tuitions for school children in a local orphanage which help them also to gain confidence in their subject. They impart awareness classes on health, sanitation, AIDS, human rights, energy conservation, water quality etc and their participation in community programmes help them to understand the problems and difficulties faced by the less privileged in the community. The departments have regular extension and outreach programmes. The Community College centralizes the extension activities of the departments and arranges programmes in conjunction with government and non governmental agencies. Students are also involved in environmental awareness campaigns which help to develop in them a concern for the environment. Awareness on issues such as energy conservation, waste management and water quality are inculcated in the students and they are encouraged to practice environment friendly living.

Clean city campaigns, flower shows and collection of plastic waste are other extension programmes through which students realize their social responsibility and develop confidence. The chief impact has been personality development through social commitment.

The regular outreach programmes include

 Visit to charitable institutions and distribution of clothes and necessaries

- Collection of food packets on Fridays for home for the destitute-Puthujeevan trust
- o Helping people affected by natural calamities
- Charity fund raised through fasting
- o Financial support and supply of study material to the inmates of Alphonsa Balika Bhavan and Mattom Colony
- o The Assumption Welfare Cell makes a weekly collection for providing noon-meal to needy students.
- o Financial aid for medical treatment was extended to students' families
- Most departments have an aid fund contributed by teachers and students to extend help to needy students for payment of exam fee, purchase of books, medicines etc.

Social Surveys, Research or Extension Work Undertaken by the College to Ensure Social Justice and Empowerment of Underprivileged Students

The Equal Opportunity Cell, sponsored by the UGC, aims to provide guidance and counseling to students from less privileged sections about chances for financial assistance, openings for higher studies etc. The Community College conducts coaching classes for Dalit Students who appear for competitive exams. The Home Science Department conducts awareness classes on epidemics, sanitation, health in the neighbouring wards and community nutrition camps in neighbouring panchayats and districts. Faculty from the department of Home Science has done research in life style diseases among tribals and a project on nutritional profile of Higher Secondary adolescent girls of the municipality. Department of Social Work organized an international seminar on Children with Disabilities. Social Work students conduct awareness campaigns among local school children on alcohol abuse and give talks on nutrition and health for adolescent girls in a nearby colony. Rural camps are also regularly conducted. The students of Communicative English, Zoology, Physics, Business Administration and Economics have conducted surveys in the different wards of the municipality on topics such as waste management, energy conservation, unemployment etc (refer **Table** 3.11).

Some of the surveys conducted by the Community College include 'Resource Mapping of Changanacherry Municipality' assigned by Land Use Board of Government of Kerala, and Community Profiling (e-literacy survey). The government's on-line registration schemes such as comprehensive health insurance registration, Birth and Death registration, BPL data entry work etc are done through the Community College. The students in the off campus stream undertook a project for KSEB for energy conservation in the year 2010.

Institutional Initiatives for Community Involvement in its Outreach Activities

The Community College ensures community involvement in the extension activities of the college. It also conducts classes and training programmes for local women and drop-outs. The Botany department provides free consultancy and training to the general public, institutions, clubs and self help groups in mushroom cultivation, spawn production, horticulture practices and vermicomposting. The College collaborates with local bodies like the municipality, local panchayats and NGOs like Changanacherry Vikasana Samithy in their health awareness programmes and 'Clean Green Changanacherry' campaigns. Our students joined with the neighbourhood resident's association to clean and green the local roads leading to the College. In order to reduce the use of plastic carry bags, leaflets are distributed in the local shops in conjunction with the Merchants' Association.

The infrastructure facilities of the college are also made available to the local community to a certain extent, especially in the Community College which was established with this aim in mind. The Akshaya Centre in the college helps the public to access government services on-line.

Local villages like Mattom Colony and Railway Colony have benefited through the extension services of the college. The College has collaborated with an NGO 'Jyothirgamaya' to provide study materials and academic counseling to children of Mattom Colony and conducted awareness programmes for their parents. Dr Sr Mercy Nedumpuram was the coordinator of the programme. Different batches of students, accompanied by the faculty, interact with inmates of local orphanages and old age homes, supplying necessaries and helping children with their studies.

Constructive Relationships Forged with Local Institutions for Various Outreach and Extension Activities

Training in mushroom cultivation and the buy back scheme along with it, is an ongoing extension activity which has enabled many in the locality to earn a living. Training programmes are conducted within and outside the College in association with NGOs like Changanacherry Social Service Society (CHASS) and local clubs like the Rotary and the Lions Club. The Social Work department and NSS units of the College have organized medical camps in collaboration with hospitals; the Social Work Department conducts public awareness programmes on social and medical issues. They have collaborated with SEWA, ARDSI, Rajagiri Outreach, UNICEF, ASSK, ICSW, Archana Women's Centre etc. Many of the teachers are office bearers/ members of committees associated with their parishes and pastoral councils.

Linkages and collaborations are initiated with a view to further the vision and mission of the College. GOs, NGOs, industries and other institutions are identified so as to collaborate in curriculum enrichment, research, training, extension, consultancy, placement etc. New generation courses like BFT, BA Museology and Archaeology, B Sc Microbiology, BA Communicative English, MTF, MSc DSFM, MSW etc require a lot of interaction with the industry and community and the departments are keen to forge linkages with external agencies. The Community College has been specially established to facilitate interface between College and Community through tie ups with GOs and NGOs.

CRITERION IV

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 Physical Facilities

Institutional Policies for Creation/Enhancement of Infrastructure for Effective Teaching and Learning

The College is always keen to enhance the infrastructure to make teaching—learning more effective. Infrastructure is upgraded to facilitate the newly introduced programmes as well as when revision in the curriculum of existing courses is done. Every effort is made to procure funds from the UGC and other funding agencies for this purpose.

Individual departments submit their requirements to the Principal who sanctions it after consultation with the Bursar. Projects which require substantial funding are brought before the Staff Council, the IQAC and the Managing Board. When it is sanctioned, effective implementation is carried out through the Planning Board, and the Building Committee, if necessary.

Facilities Available for Curricular, Co-curricular and Extra-curricular Activities

Spread over 13 acres, Assumption College has nine blocks which house 15 departments and 7 hostels with associated facilities for the effective conduct of curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular activities. Infrastructure facilities like audio visual aids, models, internet connectivity and other resources for improvement of teaching-learning are augmented annually to keep up with the academic development of the College. The College is sought out by students from across the State as well as NRI students due to the residential facilities and excellent support services provided. Situated hardly a kilometer away from the town, bus stations and railway station, the College is easily accessible to students from a distance.

Planning of Infrastructure to keep up with Academic Growth and Optimal Utilization

The Management chalks out infrastructure requirements at the beginning of the academic year and the College Planning Board and the Building Committee implement new additions to infrastructure in line with the development of the College.

With a view to enhancing teaching-learning facilities, additional infrastructure, including two seminar halls with LCD projectors and smart board were set up. The HRD and various departments utilize these to conduct various career oriented training programmes, seminars, soft skill development and leadership training programmes. The departments of Botany, Zoology, Chemistry and Computer Science make available their laboratories and service of their faculty to train higher secondary students from neighboring schools for practical sessions. The Mathematics department has a collection of mathematical models and faculty uses these to train school students in mathematics also. The Physical Education department utilizes the games courts and other facilities to train school children during vacation and to organize State level and University level competitions/camps.

The project laboratory, open to students from other institutions also, was set up for the PG Department of Physics. A Heritage Museum, attached to the Department of History caters to BA Museology & Archaeology students and is open to the public. The instruments and equipments purchased as part of the minor projects is also shared interdepartmentally. Two rooms with computer and net facilities are extended for conducting the centralized paper valuation camp of the University. The auditorium with a seating capacity of 600 is used for common programmes and rented out for public functions. It also serves as a polling booth during the general elections.

An Indoor Court, constructed in 2008, serves as a platform for academic, co-curricular and extra curricular activities. The department of Fashion Technology utilizes it for conducting fashion shows every year. It also serves as the venue for exhibition and sale by students and outsiders. The Indoor Court is also rented out to the public during holidays.

As a partner institute of IGNOU, the College conducted various UG and PG courses and served as its examination centre, utilizing the infrastructure facilities available in the College. The College also serves as examination centre for privately registered candidates of the University, for PSC examinations, and NCC certificate examinations. The College offers rooms and ICT facilities for the Centralized Valuation Camps of the University.

The CAPTECH, which serves as the general computer laboratory, offers computer training programmes for the non-teaching staff and school going students during the summer vacation.

The athletic ground is utilized to conduct community programmes like flower shows and fairs organized by APAAC in collaboration with Merchants Association of Changanacherry.


Future Expansions Planned

Master Plan of the College Campus




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Infrastructure Facilities for Students with Physical Disabilities

The College makes sure that the classes are arranged on the ground floor for students with disabilities. Special desks and chairs are provided for them in classrooms and library. Facilities like provision for scribes, separate seating arrangements and extra time are provided during examinations. They are also provided with special toilet facilities, low level sinks in the washing area, ramps and rails. The College avails of UGC funds for the welfare of physically challenged students.

Details of Residential Facilities

There are seven hostels attached to the College, including one for postgraduate students. The total capacity is 880 and at present all hostels are fully occupied. All hostels have solar water heaters, inverters, biogas plants, mini dairy farms, ample water resources, clean well equipped kitchens and bathrooms, laundry facilities, water coolers, reading rooms and libraries, recreational facilities like TV, DVD players, games, badminton courts and outdoor stages, and inmates can use the college gymnasium and health club. There are annual outings, weekend movies and picnics in all hostels. Important festivals like Onam and Christmas are celebrated. Cultural, literary and sports competitions are conducted to boost the talent of the inmates. There are inter-hostel gatherings on special occasions. Value education sessions and counseling facilities are arranged for residential students. Computer facilities and internet connection is available in all hostels.

There is a staff quarters with all facilities for 12 residential teachers, and quarters for 4 full-time sports coaches. The campus and hostels have access to safe drinking water, and the campus is provided with round –the-clock security. The security staff have on- campus residential facilities.

There is a medical officer on call for the hostels and College, and in case of emergencies, students are taken to the multi-specialty hospital run by the same management. An infirmary with first aid facilities is maintained in the campus. The Diet Clinic of the Home Science Department enables students to check their BMI and gives advice on food and nutrition requirements. The NSS units of the College conduct medical, cancer detection, blood group detection/ donation camps and cataract detection camp in association with government and private hospitals.

Common Facilities Available on Campus

A full time Counseling Cell functions in the Student Amenity Centre which also provides facilities for recreation and indoor games. The IQAC office is equipped with computer with internet, printer and sufficient filing facilities. There are separate rooms for HR Department, Placement and Career Cell. Non residential teachers avail of the staff rest room attached to the staff quarters. The Community College runs many of the extension activities of the College. It also has a Day-care centre for children of staff and local people. The College has a car for official use and two College buses for the convenience of students who commute from interior areas also. A separate transformer has been installed by the College to meet increasing power and voltage requirements.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

Library Advisory Committee – Composition and Significant Initiatives

There is a library committee comprising the Principal, librarian, faculty representatives and student representatives. A senior member of the faculty is the Coordinator.

The Committee advises and helps the librarian in the following matters:

- ► Allocation of funds and grants
- Purchase of books
- > Stock verification of books, journals and e-resources
- > Subscription towards journals of various subjects
- Redress of students' grievances regarding the library, which are forwarded by the grievance cell
- > General functioning of the library
- Student feedback

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Physical Facilities, Learning Resources, Specialized Services and Working Hours

The automated college library has an area of 906 sq mts, spread over three floors with a seating capacity of 250. On working days, the library is open from 8.30 am to 6 pm and on holidays and vacation from 10 am to 4 pm. The ground floor for general reading is stocked with newspapers, magazines, journals, references, dissertations etc. New arrivals are displayed, OPAC which registers about 25 logins per day, archives and photostat and printing facilities are available here. Separate reading area is available for staff.

The first floor has the general stacks, documentation section, electronic section with access to e-journals through INFLIBNET and the second floor is devoted to reference books and book bank for students. The library has a total of 12 computers of which 5 belong to the e-learning room. Students have free access to the computers with broadband internet facility of 100mbps speed. A Photostat machine and two printers ensure efficient service. The following details give an overview of the use of the library:

* Average number of walk-ins - 300/day

* Average number of books issued/returned - 100/day

* Ratio of library books to students enrolled - 35:1

* Average number of books added during last three years - 696

* Average number of login to e-resources - 15/day

* Average number of e-resources downloaded/printed - 60-70/day

The specialized services provided by the library include facilities for Reference, Question Bank CDs, Reprography, Book binding, Inter library loan service, Information deployment and notification, Downloading and Printing, Reading list/ Bibliography compilation, User-orientation and awareness, assistance in searching databases etc. Security is ensured through surveillance camera functioning in the library.

Purchase and Use of Current Titles and Journals

Funds sanctioned by the UGC are allocated in the budget for the purchase of books, reading materials and CDs. According to the requirements of new courses, revision of syllabus etc, the management allocates sufficient amounts and departments take up the initiative to purchase books. In addition to the books available in the General Library all department stock a good number of text books, reference books and journals.

LIBRARY LAYOUT



Support Provided by Library Staff to Users

The librarian instructs freshers on the rules and regulations of the library as well as the facilities available there. The staff helps students to locate books and magazines, helps them with the book bank and guides them in using e-resources and educational CDs. Inter library loans are arranged for students, on request. New arrivals are displayed, and back issues of magazines and journals are maintained in the archives. Residential students are trained by the library staff, after college working hours, in the systematic arrangement of books in their respective disciplines. The library has instituted Best User Awards for UG and PG students.

Special Facilities for the Visually/Physically Challenged

Physically challenged students are granted extended borrowing time and they can borrow books through their friends. The library staff assists such students in taking books from the higher shelves and upper floors. Braille facility is available in the library.

Use of Library Feedback for Improving Services

The library committee collects feedback from users in a specific format. It is analysed and discussed by the committee to redress grievances, further enhance facilities and improve services. The shifting of reference books and issue counter to the upper floors was effected following suggestions from users.

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4. 3 IT Infrastructure

Computing Facilities within the College

Since all departments require ICT enabled teaching-learning, purchase and upgradation of hardware and software is carried out every year.

ICT Facilities Available to Faculty and Students On and Off-campus

The entire campus is LAN connected. The College has a general computer lab with internet connection in 32 stations, and students and faculty have access to it during working hours, and beyond, if necessary. Apart from the general lab there are 4 computer laboratories attached to various departments. All departments are provided with computers with net facilities. The Community College has a well equipped computer laboratory of its own. The library provides browsing facilities as well as an electronic section with 5

computers. Off the campus, all hostels have computers with internet connections. Wi-Fi facility is available in the Fashion Technology block.

Institutional Strategies for Deploying and Upgrading IT Infrastructure and Facilities

A System Administrator has been entrusted with the deploying of IT resources. Log books are maintained and students belonging to all streams can avail of IT facilities in the general lab as well as the UGC network resource centre and seminar halls. Upgraded versions of existing software and hardware are installed as required, and new and advanced software in keeping with curriculum revisions and new courses are installed when necessary.

Student - centric Teaching-learning Process

New software are installed to enable students to take up project work in fields that interest them. Audio visual aids are used in teaching and students are required to present seminars and assignments using ICT. Institutional Mechanisms for Maintenance and Upkeep of Infrastructure Facilities and Equipment

The Planning Board and departments chalk out requirements in maintenance and upkeep of infrastructural facilities and equipments. Funds available from external sources such as UGC and State government are availed of and utilized to the maximum. Extra expenses are met by the Management and other bodies. For example, running charges for the generator and maintenance of intercom facility are met by the PTA and Staff Association respectively. Full time technicians are available on campus for the maintenance of ICT equipments. Technicians are available on campus for electrical and infrastructure maintenance whenever necessary.

Calibration and Other Precision Measures for Equipment/Instruments

Annual checking of laboratory equipments, and stock verification are regular practices at the end of each year. This is ratified by faculty concerned, Head of the department and a faculty member from another department. This is again verified by the Principal and government auditors on an annual basis.

Calibration and precision measures are taken up for instruments by the faculty, lab assistants and mechanic of the departments concerned. If major repair is required, the suppliers or service providers are approached. A transformer was installed in the campus to safeguard precision equipment against voltage fluctuations. A lightning arrester ensures protection of electrical and IT equipment. All computers in the campus have UPS facility.

Major Steps taken for Location, Upkeep and Maintenance of Sensitive Equipments

A transformer has been installed in the campus to overcome problems due to voltage fluctuations and a generator of capacity 55KVA supplies power in the whole campus ensures fulltime electrical supply in laboratories, seminar halls etc. All computer labs have back-up facility. The electronics labs are equipped with voltage regulators for the protection of sensitive devices. Two ponds and a well, along with rain water harvesting mechanism ensure constant supply of water.

CRITERION V

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

Prospectus and Handbook

Updated versions of the College prospectus and hand book are brought out annually. The Prospectus, which is given to prospective applicants, provides information about the College, various courses offered, fee structure and rules of admission. The handbook includes a chronicle of the College, the general time table, details of residential facilities, student services, extracurricular activities and teachers in charge of each activity. In addition to the information in the prospectus, the calendar cum handbook gives the rules and regulations of the College, regulations against ragging and use of mobile phones (as directed by the UGC), details of syllabi of courses offered, pattern of evaluation, financial assistance and scholarships available to students of various departments, various subject associations, different programmes organized in the College and the academic calendar. The calendar cum handbook also includes a staff directory. The College website provides information about the various departments, academic programmes, co-curricular/extracurricular activities and important announcements.

The academic calendar and prospectus are revised every year in keeping with the schedule of the University calendar. The handbook is distributed to all the students and they are expected to be aware of the information provided therein. The GRC, PTA, learning journal and the annual student feedback ensure accountability.

Financial Assistance Received by Students from Government and other National Agencies

Every effort is made to procure financial assistance from Central/State and other agencies for needy and deserving students. The staff in charge of the Equal Opportunity Cell attends government organized orientation sessions on availing and disbursal of scholarships instituted by the central and state governments as well as the UGC and other agencies. In 2011-12 a total amount of Rs 2,47,500/- was given to twenty SC/ST/OBC and Minority students per month under 'Colleges with relatively higher proportion of SC/ST Minority' scheme of the UGC.

The various Scholarships include the Central government scholarship, Sports scholarships, State government scholarships (Post metric, State merit, Higher education, Muslim Girls, Kerala State Suvarna Jubilee Merit, KPCR and Pratibha) and other scholarships like University merit and Fisherman scholarship. Stipend from Harijan Welfare Department for students of SC/ST categories are directly credited to their personal bank accounts. Sports students

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receive scholarships from the University and also from the Government of Kerala. The details of the scholarships are furnished below.

Specific Support Services Available for:

✓ Students from SC/ST, OBC, Economically Weaker Sections/ Students with Physical Disabilities and Overseas Students

The Equal Opportunity Cell, with one faculty member and support staff in charge, briefs students on the financial assistance they can avail of, and disburses on time the government and university funds available for them. Special fees and PTA fund are not collected from SC/ST students. Fee

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concession is granted by the Management for the economically backward and for sports students. Using funds raised by teachers and students one house was constructed and eleven houses were renovated for needy students. Charity funds of the Departments are utilized to meet the expenses of study tours, purchase of books and stationery and travel fares. Special attention is given in availing the UGC funds (for colleges with higher proportion of SC/ST/OBC/Minority) and disbursing it to the eligible students. In the case of self- financing courses, economically weaker students are granted fee concessions and complete fee waiver with the help of the contributions of sponsors. Remedial coaching and coaching for competitive examinations are offered for them with the assistance of UGC and other agencies.

Differently abled students are given reservation (3%) during admission and after admission they are given adequate support system for exploiting their potential to the maximum. The support systems include special infrastructure facilities like special seating arrangements. Rooms on the ground floor are allotted to them in the College as well as in the hostel. They are given extra attention and coaching. The College has a low percentage of overseas and NRI students. Residential facilities are provided to outstation students.

✓ Support for Students to Participate in National /International Competitions

Training is given to students who participate in national and international competitions and expenses for the same are partly met. Accommodation and contingency expenses of such students are met by the College management. Teachers in charge accompany students and college conveyance is arranged whenever necessary.

✓ Medical Assistance to Students: Health Centre, Health Insurance

Departments take the initiative to meet the medical expenses of the needy students and sometimes of their family members also. There is a doctor on call and a nearby hospital under the same management for emergency needs. Medical check up is mandatory for final year students. The Kerala Sports Council gives financial assistance to sports students who suffer from injuries. Preventive medicines are distributed to students in times of epidemics. Awareness classes on health issues are conducted and medical camps are arranged within the campus.

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✓ Coaching Classes for Competitive Examinations

Coaching classes are arranged for MAT, CAT, Bank tests, PSC tests etc. with expert faculty from outside. The Community College offers special coaching classes for PSC tests and Bank tests for dalit students.

✓ Skill Development (spoken English, computer literacy etc.)

The HR department gives regular soft skill sessions for all students apart from an enrichment module for students according to their competency levels. The English Department offers a Language Improvement Programme for students to improve their spoken English skills. The Computer Science department in association with the College Computer Centre and APACC Computer Centre offer short term computer literacy modules as well as advanced computer programmes for all students. There is also a Certificate in Computer Literacy programme under the convergence scheme of IGNOU.

✓ Support for Slow Learners

The teacher in charge of remedial coaching co-ordinates remedial sessions for slow learners. Tutorial sessions are also given to them. They are given extra time to complete practical sessions and peer learning is encouraged with advanced learners as group leaders. During the XI Plan of the UGC, Rs. 5,09,500/- was utilized for the conduct of remedial classes for SC/ST/OBC/minority students.

✓ Exposure of Students to Institutions of Higher Learning/ Corporate/Business Houses

On- the-job training and field visits are arranged for students in prestigious institutions and all the Science departments have periodical visits to research centres such as Rubber Research Institute of India, Tropical Botanical Garden and Research Institute, Dairy Training Centre and Indian Institute of Fisheries. Students are accompanied by faculty and college conveyance is arranged for group visits. PG students are encouraged to use the facilities offered by research institutes and university libraries for their project work.

✓ Publication of Student Magazines


There is a College Magazine published annually, apart from the class magazines and manuscript magazines brought out by students of English, Malayalam, History, Zoology and Botany. Students of BA Communicative English bring out a campus newspaper as part of their training in Journalism.

✓ Personality Development

The college offers various life guidance programmes to promote the allround development of its students. Premarital courses are arranged for every batch of final year students. Annual retreat and value education programmes conducted for different religious groups help in the spiritual formation of students. The HR department conducts personality development workshops and seminars for the students.

Impact of Institutional Efforts to Facilitate Entrepreneurial Skills among Students

Most of the departments conduct enrichment modules which help the students in developing their entrepreneurship abilities. The food fest and exhibition by Home Science department and exhibition cum sale by the Fashion Technology department, stalls put up in connection with Mission Day etc. help students to earn and learn. The various enrichment modules and addon courses are offered to improve the career prospects of students. The Entrepreneurship Development Club promotes the spirit of self-employment. The Club has instituted Entrepreneurship Excellence award to recognize women entrepreneurs. Visits to neighbouring co-operative societies, farms and other voluntary agencies motivate the students to seek self-employment. The Assumption Food Processing Incubator funded by the Directorate of Industries and Commerce and training in Mushroom cultivation and training modules offered in the Community College enable students and local women to start their own enterprises. The Business Incubation Centre for Women started in the Community College, the southern wing of FIWE and the Assumption Fashion Boutique are aimed at promoting entrepreneurial skills of the students. The College has also taken steps to initiate alumnae members into entrepreneurship through the above ventures.

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Institutional Policies to Promote Student Participation in Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities

It is ensured that students who take part in NCC and NSS camps, sports and games, and other extracurricular activities do not suffer from attendance shortage. Students who lose classes are free to approach teachers during and outside college hours to make up for the loss. Special coaching is given to such students. The science departments arrange extra practical sessions for them. They are permitted to take time off for practice and rehearsals, and retests are given to them if they are absent for internal examinations. Extended time is allowed for them in the submission of assignments if required. Extra tuition sessions are arranged for sports students by the Physical Education Department. Special arrangement is requested to the University for conducting semester exams for sports students whenever they miss the examinations. Various clubs and departmental associations functioning in the college help to promote the participation of students in extra curricular activities. One learning hour/week is allotted for club activities.

Free refreshments are supplied from the college canteen for participants and trainers during rehearsals before intercollegiate fests and youth festivals. Special nutritious diet is served for sportswomen and NSS and NCC volunteers.

The College avails of the full time services of professional coaches deputed by the State Sports Council. Sports uniforms and track suits as well as prizes for outstanding sportswomen are procured through sponsorship.

Announcements are made through the public address system and put up on the notice board to congratulate and encourage students who distinguish themselves through achievements in curricular and extracurricular fields. Rank holders and other outstanding achievers are honoured in a public function on Merit Day. Students who distinguish themselves in international and national sports meets are felicitated in the College. All expenses for training, costumes, travel and participation are borne by the institution in the case of students participating in group events in youth festivals etc. Facilities such as separate halls, auditorium, audio visual aids, ICT facilities etc. are available for training and practice in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Whenever necessary, hostel accommodation is also provided.

Support and Guidance Provided to Students in Preparing for Competitive Examinations

The Career Orientation Cell provides coaching for competitive exams such as MAT, Bank tests and PSC tests. External and internal trainings are arranged for final year students to help them face placement drives, interviews and Group Discussions. In addition to this the department of Mathematics offers short term modules in numerical ability and logical reasoning. On an average 45-50 students benefit from the coaching annually. Sixty students have passed NET during 2007-2012.

Counseling Services Available to Students

A mentoring programme has been introduced to ensure the psychosocial welfare of students. A faculty mentor is assigned to thirty students and a regular session is allotted for mentoring once a week, though students are free to approach their mentors at all times. The mentor provides timely help to students with problems like poor academic performance, family and relationship problems. Through mentoring, students get intellectual, academic and psychological assistance from teachers. Students who need professional help are referred to the Counselling Cell by their mentors.

The College has a Counselling Centre with two professional full time counsellors. The Guidance and Counselling Cell encourages students to utilize their potentialities, capabilities and creativity and to improve their interpersonal relationships. This in turn enables them to face the challenges and responsibilities of life with confidence.

Career Guidance and Placement Services

The Placement Cell in the College does a very good job in helping the students to procure the jobs they aspire for. Final year students are given the option to register their names with the Placement Cell so that they may be notified of suitable job opportunities. It organizes placement drives and career orientation programmes and sends students to placement drives in other institutions. Reputed firms like Wipro, Infosys, TCS, Accenture, HCL, public sector banks etc. have employed our students through campus recruitment programmes. The Career Cell also provides training in interview skills, GD, and soft skills by professional trainers. An amount of Rs. 2, 95,500 was utilized by the Career and Counselling Cell during the XII Plan period.

Institutional Provisions for Resolving Issues Pertaining to Sexual Harassment

An Anti- Sexual Harassment Cell has been set up for the redressal of the problems faced by our students while traveling to and from the College. A complaint box has been installed in the campus by the police to help them in such cases. In case of nuisance, the police are informed and they embark on patrolling. There has been no incidence of sexual harassment reported in the campus. Awareness classes and programmes are organized by Kerala State Women's Welfare Forum and the Women Cell of Assumption College.

Anti-ragging Committee

Freshers are required to sign an undertaking, attested by the parent, against the practice of ragging in any form. According to UGC regulations, there is an anti-ragging and ethic committee, with the Principal as the nodal officer, to inquire into any issues of ragging that may arise. Charges of ragging are extremely rare and if any arise the committee conducts serious enquiries and resolves the issue in a peaceful manner.

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Welfare Schemes made Available to Students by the Institution

Micro finance deposit scheme is made available for students through Changanassery Social Service Society. The college bus was purchased with financial assistance from NRI parents. Students take a voluntary collection on Fridays under the auspices of the Assumption Welfare Cell and the amount is used to fund the free noon meal programme. Charity funds are raised by students by setting up sales stalls as well as observing a fasting day annually. The teaching staff raised Rs. 2, 45,000/- towards the housing scheme for 12 needy students. Financially backward students are granted fee concession by the College, department association fee is waived and they are given uniform allowance. They can also commute at concessional rates by college bus. Many departments as well as the general library offer book bank facility and the PTA provides notebooks for needy students.

Alumni Association- Activities and Major Contributions


The Association of Assumption Alumnae (AASA) aims at fostering fellowship among the alumni and maintaining their continued contact with the College. It has chapters in the New York, Chicago, Kuwait, Qatar and in North India. Every year meetings of the alumnae association are held at college and departmental levels. At the end of the academic year all the outgoing students are enrolled as the members of the alumnae association. **Thirty four scholarships** for students, including the **Gold Medal for Best Outgoing Student**, have been instituted by our alumnae. The Chicago Chapter has instituted an annual **Best Alumna Award**, and there are other scholarships instituted by the alumnae of various departments and the chapters of the Association in different countries. The various departments conduct lectures by distinguished alumni for the benefit of students. At times well placed alumni are invited over to orient and motivate students towards higher study options, research and careers.

5.2 Student Progression

Most students go on to post graduation after their UG programmes. A majority of the outgoing PG students pursue B Ed and a few register for MPhil/ PhD. Apart from campus placements from UG programmes, PG students get employment in private and government firms. A good number of

Home Science/ Fashion Technology gradutes venture into entrepreneurship. That our outstanding sportswomen are placed in State and Central departments is a matter of satisfaction. Alumnae from the UG and PG departments also do us proud by acquiring research degrees. Our alumna Ms Sindhu M T qualified in the IES examination in 2011

Promotion of Student Progression to Higher Level of Education/ Employment

Academics are given prime importance and all prescribed portions are dealt with thoroughly in class. As a result the College has a record of excellent performance in the university examinations and students get admitted to reputed colleges and institutes for higher studies. Distinguished alumni are invited for expert lectures and to orient students towards higher studies, research, competitive exams or career guidance.

The Career Orientation Cell and Placement Cell conduct Placement drives and Career fests to create awareness about viable career options and the avenues open for higher studies. The new-generation academic programmes offered by the College are all career oriented, as are many of the elective courses offered at the UG level. The Enrichment modules offered by the departments and coaching for competitive exams are meant to help students proceed to higher studies/employment.

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Students who have completed teacher training are given all support to join in leave vacancies at schools so that their chances for permanent employment are not lost.

Special Support Provided to Students at Risk of Failure and Drop out

Students at risk of failure are given extra attention through tutorial sessions and remedial coaching. Simplified study materials are provided and retests are given. They are given extra time to complete practical sessions. As a result there are almost no dropouts. However students who cannot attend classes regularly in a semester due to illness or domestic circumstances are dealt with leniently—they are allowed to appear for retests and granted extra time to submit assigned work and special facilities at the time of examinations; they are also granted readmission. The Community College runs a day care centre and married students are encouraged to bring their children to the Centre so that there is no disruption in their academic programmes. Such measures ensure that students who wish to continue studies, are able to do so in spite of all hurdles.

5.3 Student Participation and Activities

Range of Sports, Games, Cultural and other Extracurricular Activities Available to Students

The College encourages and promotes the talents and interests of the students through well- functioning clubs like Music Club, Tourism Club, Debate Club, Theatre Club, Nature Club, Yoga Club, Film Club, Arts Club, Entrepreneurial Development Club, Quiz Club, Oratory Club and Folklore Club. Each club has a member of the faculty as an advisor. Every week one learning hour is utilized for various club activities. The various departmental associations organize inter collegiate, interdepartmental and intradepartmental seminars and competitions.


At present the NCC wing (army) of the College has two battalions with 108 cadets and there are two units of the NSS with 200 volunteers.


Annual sports day is conducted for the whole college and there are facilities for indoor games, yoga, aerobics, badminton etc.


Range of Participation - 2007-12

Utilization of Feedback from Graduates and Employers for Quality Improvement

Alumnae meets are occasions to receive suggestions from the graduates regarding the improvements in performance and institutional provisions. This facility is available in the college website also. When students are sent on internships and on-the-job-trainings in various streams, feedback and suggestions are collected from employers. Suggestions from all these quarters are discussed and implemented wherever possible.

Wall Magazines, College Magazine, and other Publications/ Materials Brought out by Students in the Last Four Academic Sessions

The College takes special care in promoting the creative and artistic talents of its students. The College Magazine and the manuscript magazines of various departments give students an opportunity to foster their literary skills. Each department is provided with a wall magazine which gives the students opportunities to work in groups and exhibit their creativity. Prizes are also awarded to the best wall magazines to encourage students. Departmental competitions are also arranged to inculcate in students the spirit of healthy competition. The department of Malayalam has launched a website to give our students an opportunity to reach out to the public. Students of Communicative English and Journalism bring out campus newspapers highlighting the activities in the college. Major publication/materials brought about by the college and departments include the College Magazine-Assumpta, College Newsletter-Acsent and departmental newsletters. Manuscript magazine OIKOS-2007 of Zoology department was awarded first prize in manuscript magazine competition conducted by the Zoological Society of Kerala; Haritha of the Botany Department, "Pranavam"-manuscript magazine of Malayalam department, Historia of the History Department, manuscript magazines of all three batches of BA English Literature and BA communicative English offer ample scope for students to bring out their creative and literary talents. Kelikottu- in house journal of Malayalam department and 'In Touch' newsletter of Home Science department are two other publications brought out annually.

Student Council and Other Bodies with Student Representation

The College ensures that the students also have a role to play in its administration and Students' Council or the College Union is elected for this purpose. It comprises students from different streams and they all join hands together for the efficient and smooth functioning of the Institution and in boosting students' participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. All students are members of the Union. The Electoral College consists of representatives elected in the parliamentary method from all classes. Members of the Electoral College elect the executive body of the Students' Union as per University guidelines. The Students Union executive has a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, General Secretary, University Union

Councillors, Editor of the College Magazine, Arts Club Secretary and representatives from all classes. The funding of the Union mainly comes from the students and our well wishers outside the campus. Our student was nominated as sports representative to the University Students Union this year.

The Electoral College meets once a month for evaluation and redress of students' issues. The services of NCC cadets and student volunteers are utilized for maintaining discipline as well as in the conduct of public meetings within the College. A core group of advanced learners are identified for such purposes. The union conducts youth festivals, literary competitions, beauty pageants, stage programmes, talent shows, musical concerts, Onam, Christmas and Kerala Piravi celebrations. Students are given representation in the IQAC and library committee. The prefects of the various classes in the hostels have an active involvement in decisions related to student welfare. The College Union Editor is in charge of the College Magazine. All the departmental associations have student secretaries who give leadership in conducting the activities of the associations including intercollegiate competitions and fests.

Networking with Alumnae and Former Faculty of the Institution

The Alumnae Association of the college (AASA) is keenly interested in the activities of the College. Alumnae can register their membership in the Association on the College website. Annual meetings of the Association are held in the College, and individual departments sometimes conduct get together of old students. The Alumnae Association of the Home Science Department has a newsletter that helps members to keep in touch with the College and each other. Our old students are the first members registered at the Assumption Business Incubation Centre for training in entrepreneurship. Alumna lectures are arranged for students in various disciplines by their respective departments.

An association of the former faculty of the institution (ReTAAC), with 96 members, makes it easier for the retired teachers to network with the College. They actively participate in the functions held in the College and departments. Their meetings and gatherings are held in the College and they have instituted a scholarship for the Best Outgoing UG Student. The Counselling Cell of the College avails of their services in its efforts to give psycho social guidance to students. Retired faculty have also served as programme coordinators and advisory board members of the Community College.

CRITERION VI

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

Vision, Mission and Distinctive Characteristics of the Institution in Addressing the Needs of society

Vision

To maintain the highest academic standards upholding the noblest Christian ideals and moral values to create enlightened, empowered and socially committed women.

Distinctive Features Defined by Mission Statement

Assumption College, being a women's college situated in Central Kerala, all its activities chiefly focus on educating women to make them globally competent and empowered enough to contribute to community building. In keeping with the vision of the founding fathers, the College makes every effort to educate women from all sections of society. Maximum access is given for students from socially and economically backward sections. In the last decade a number of new generation job-oriented programmes were introduced to facilitate employment opportunities. A distinctive attraction of the College is the seven hostels attached to it. About 850 students reside in the hostels, which promote value oriented social life, while giving the inmates every opportunity to develop their leadership qualities and extracurricular abilities. They offer a safe haven for students from abroad.

A large number of students from migrant families of Malabar area and rural agrarian region of Kuttanad prefer to be educated in this institution which provides a fertile ground for academic excellence and character formation. The location of the College also provides easy access to students from different areas.

Opportunities are provided for drop outs and women of all ages to undergo vocational training through the Community College which offers job oriented short term courses. The Community College also encourages prospective women entrepreneurs to avail of the training provided by the Business Incubation Centre. The college involves the local community in the process of society building.

The College tries to encourage a research culture in the campus through engagement in research projects and doctoral studies, publication of College Research Journal, and conduct of conferences and seminars. The College became a partner institute of IGNOU offering part time and vocational /technical courses with a view to train youth for employment. An Equal Opportunity Cell set up in the College aims to make higher education 'affordable, accessible and equitable' through financial assistance and

scholarships for minorities, backward communities and the physically challenged.

The development of an integrated personality is aimed at through extracurricular activities, life skill programmes, annual retreats, and charity projects. The College envisions the emergence of young leaders and independent women who are capable of catering to the needs of the changing society. Through regular value education and life guidance seminars, the College seeks to mould women who can set up successful families in the wake of the pervasive moral decline in society.

Assumption is also renowned for its outstanding performance in sports and games, producing a number of international players and athletes including an Arjuna Award winning Olympian.

Role of Top Management, Principal and Faculty in Design and Implementation of its Quality Policy and Plans

The Patron of the College is the Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Changanacherry. The Managing Board, with a three-year term, is in immediate and overall charge of the affairs of the College especially the financial and broad policy matters. The Managing Board consists of the Patron, Manager, Principal, Vice-Principal, Bursar, the Procurator of the Archdiocese, at least three experts from different fields and two staff representatives—one elected by the staff and one nominated by the management. The Managing Board usually meets twice a year and more often if necessary. The Patron and the President of the Managing Board visit the College and meet the staff on all important occasions and whenever any special issue arises.

The head of the institution is the Principal who takes final decisions in the routine affairs of the College in keeping with the policies of the management. On the administrative side the Principal is assisted by the Vice Principal. All the major decisions and policy changes are implemented in consultation with the Managing Board and Staff Council. The Staff Council is a statutory body which consists of the Principal, Vice- Principal, Librarian and Heads of all departments. The Staff Council meets once a month or more often. Meetings and discussions at various levels ensure transparency and co ordination in organisational and administrative process and involves the participation of all concerned. The heads of the departments who are members of the Staff Council consult their respective faculty members who put in suggestions. Important issues are discussed at the general body meetings of the associations of teaching staff and non teaching staff and this guarantees the involvement of faculty and support staff in all major decisions taken.

Quality initiatives suggested by the Departments are brought to the Staff Council and IQAC. After discussion, practically possible suggestions are forwarded to the Managing Board for approval. Policies are implemented

through different committees after approval is granted. At the end of every year the Manager and Principal visit all the departments for an internal audit. Interactive discussions at various levels offer easy access to the top management and Principal.

Involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

• The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission

The Patron and the Manager occasionally meet the staff Council and the departments individually to review the academic performance and efforts taken for the overall development of students. Each department has a monthly action plan which is communicated to other departments through the Staff Council. Based on this, a general action plan is drawn for the College. Important suggestions regarding policy changes are discussed by the Managing Board to ensure its relevance to the mission of the College. New initiatives are also put forward by the Managing Board.

• Formulation of action plans and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

Institutional activities for the year are carried out based on the action plan drawn up at the beginning of the academic year taking inputs from staff and students at the close of the previous year. Each academic year, about fifty committees are formed to carry out the institutional action plan.

• Interaction with stakeholders

The Manager, Principal and staff interact with stakeholders including parents, alumnae and retired faculty in the periodic meetings of their associations. Review is also solicited from firms and industries where students

undergo OJT. The Students Union, the Grievance Redressal Cell and Non Teaching Staff Association also ensure interaction of the leadership with students and support staff. The Community College helps in the interface between the institution and the community, local governing bodies and NGOs.

• Proper Support for Policy and Planning through Need Analysis, Research Inputs and Consultations with the Stakeholders

The Institution has a student friendly policy of a brain storming session being conducted by the Principal at the beginning of each year. Their inputs and suggestions are exhibited on class wise basis. Participatory departmental appraisal of all departments is done by students of BBA, MBA and Social Work. The PTA and Alumnae Association put forward proposals for improving student support services. Through the initiative of the PTA, MP fund was sanctioned for solar power plant. The Association also funds counseling services offered to students. Need analysis of each department is done by the Principal and IQAC. The Management gives full support for planning and implementation of the proposals. An evaluation of the resources and performance of each department is presented in the staff general body meeting. Feedback on teaching and internal and external audit of various departments is used for policy formulation and planning.

• Reinforcing the Culture of Excellence

The College aims to reinforce excellence through various strategies like visiting premier institutions, honouring top achievers and conducting Meet Excellence Series. The management is keen to offer all support for enhancing the quality of the College in all fields and makes maximum utilization of funds for augmenting and updating learning resources and infrastructure, and takes care to recruit competent faculty strictly on the basis of merit. The coaching programmes, value added programmes, HRD, Career Orientation Cell, etc are entrusted to the directorship of faculty members

• Champion Organizational Change

The Principal, Vice Principal and IQAC coordinator attend conferences related to quality improvement in academics/ administration and share their experiences and knowledge gained with the staff and students. Bottom up approaches ensure a decentralized pattern of governance. To achieve this end, some of the organizational changes introduced by the Management are: appointment of Vice Principal as the Director of Community College, a faculty member being entrusted with the duty of Bursar, retired faculty being appointed as programme coordinators of self financed courses and the Community College. Conscientisation and sensitization of students about cross cutting issues are done through campaigns, opinion poll, field visits, observation of internationally important days etc. The management involves faculty representatives in the decision making process and

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administration. International collaboration, and Business Incubation Centre for Women Entrepreneurs are new ventures initiated by the management.

Procedures Adopted to Monitor and Evaluate Policies and Plans for Effective Implementation of Programmes

The PIME (Planning Implementation Management Evaluation) approach is adopted by the College to ensure quality. Every academic year a pre-planning session is conducted for this purpose. The Principal makes a presentation of the activities of the previous year and the projected plans for the coming year at the Managing Board meeting at the start and close of the academic year. Based on this, the members may suggest improvements and changes which are monitored and followed up in the subsequent meetings of the Board. At the end of the academic year the Principal delegates faculty committees to evaluate the activities of the departments, sub units and support systems. Reports are submitted by the committees for review by the Principal and IQAC. Annual review reports are presented at PTA and Alumnae meetings and on College Day. Meetings of the Staff Council and Staff Association are held regularly and required changes in day to day activities are discussed and implemented. The IQAC meetings also provide opportunities for effective implementation of plans and policies. The executive body of the Students' Union convenes meetings of the Electoral College to discuss and make suggestions regarding the programmes to be introduced for the overall development of students. The various suggestions that emerge in the meeting are conveyed to the Principal for consideration and implementation. Student feedback taken through the IQAC and GRC also contribute to changes. Preparation of the Annual Quality Assurance Report is also a way of evaluating the performance of the College.

Monthly meetings of hostel wardens with the Principal and Vice Principal and term-end meetings with Manager and Principal help in evaluating and improving the services offered by the hostels.



Channelizing Leadership at Various Levels by the Top Management

The College adopts a decentralized system for participatory management to ensure academic and administrative efficiency at all levels. Teachers direct and co-ordinate academic and extracurricular activities and share administrative responsibilities in keeping with their qualification, seniority, experience and abilities. The Staff Council is an apex body for decision making and assists the Principal in policy formulation and implementation. The Heads of the Departments are entrusted with administrative duties relating to their departments and the institution. Orientation sessions, leadership and personality workshops are arranged for the staff from time to time. Responsibilities are delegated to the associations of the teaching and non teaching staff.

The Institution grooms leadership at various levels starting from students. The Students Union, Electoral College, Class prefects and secretaries of the department associations and different clubs take leadership in conducting their respective programmes under the guidance of teachers in charge. The student leaders of hostels have a voice in the day to day running of the hostels.

Decentralized Governance

The Vice Principal and administrative staff assist the Principal in administrative matters for the smooth functioning of the College. The IQAC takes initiatives for quality improvement. The Heads of the Departments are given autonomy in matters dealing with their departments. They take decisions in the routine running of the department - allotment of work, timetable, distribution of duties in extracurricular activities, conduct of internal examinations, attendance of students, matters of student discipline etc. Only extraordinary cases are referred to the Staff Council. However the Principal is informed of any changes in these areas and the decision of the committee led by the Principal is always final. The departments are run in a more or less uniform manner as common decisions are arrived at in the Staff Council. The Community College which coordinates extension activities has autonomy in organizational and academic matters.

Promotion of Participative Management

Issues relating to the department are discussed in frequently held department meetings. All members are welcome to contribute their suggestions which are taken into consideration. Decisions on matters of common interest are arrived at in IQAC and Staff Council meetings. At times feedback from the departments are conveyed by the Head to top management. Student admissions are made by an admission committee comprising the Principal, heads and teacher representatives of the respective departments. Student leaders are involved in discussion of issues pertaining to the student community and their active involvement is ensured through bodies such as Electoral College, College Union, GRC, CSM, NSS, NCC, and various clubs.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Development, Deployment and Review of Quality Policy

The quality policy of the Institution is stated in the vision and mission of the College. It is developed through the perspective plan at the beginning of each year; action plans are drawn up by the departments and implemented. They are reviewed through feedback from stakeholders, internal and external audit, considering the needs of the time and discussions at year end. The introduction of new courses, appointment of efficient and qualified faculty, maintenance and upgradation of infrastructure and learning facilities, provision for excellent support facilities etc are some of the ways in which academic excellence is ensured.

Aspects of Perspective Plan for Development

Perspective plans for development are drawn up at the beginning of a year. In the process, the vision and mission of the College are kept in sight. The thrust area identified by NAAC, the higher education policies of the UGC and Government are also considered. Perspective institutional plan is made by the management after discussion at various levels in a participatory manner. Every year the College focuses on a specific area for improvement and mobilizes resources accordingly. The following have been the thrust areas in recent years:

- 2008-09 -- Promotion of values
- 2009-10 Concern for the less privileged
- 2010-11— Environment issues and eco friendly practices
- 2011-12 -- Infrastructure development
- 2012-13 —Women empowerment and entrepreneurship promotion

Quality Improvement Strategies

• Teaching & Learning

The best available faculty are recruited, strictly on merit basis. An academic calendar drawn up at the beginning of the year is closely adhered to so that the syllabus is completed in time and internal evaluations are done according to schedule. The management ensures that faculty avail of the maximum available quota for PhD/MPhil under FDP of the UGC. Infrastructure and learning resources are enhanced and maintained/ updated in a timely manner. Classrooms, laboratories and library are well equipped. Each department is provided with ICT facilities so that audio visual aids are utilised in teaching- learning. Departments are given all support to conduct seminars

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and workshops and teachers are encouraged to participate in external conferences and workshops. Advanced learners and slow learners are catered to in different ways so that all students may use their maximum potential. Student feedback, Teachers work Diary and Students Learning journal are mechanisms for monitoring the teaching learning process.

• Research & Development

The Research Promotion Council of the College brings out research journal and aims to provide guidance to teachers for pursuing research and applying for research projects. Student research projects are given infrastructural and technical assistance. Expert lectures are arranged frequently by all departments. The Computer laboratory and library with INFLIBNET facility are meant to help teachers and students utilise these beyond their regular academic requirements.

• Community Engagement

Apart from regular NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross etc, the College has a scheme called Open NSS through which all students are given opportunities for personality development through community service, without the stipulations demanded by NSS. A number of projects/surveys on socially relevant issues and problems are undertaken by the College. An important step taken up by the Institution is the establishment of a Community College attached to the College, with a view to step up and centralise the extension activities of the different departments.

• Human Resource Management


Inhouse HR programmes are arranged annually for the faculty and students. These include motivational talks, soft skills training and stress management sessions. In self financing courses, efficient and experienced faculty are appointed by the management, in addition to those in the regular vacancies sanctioned by the government. Experienced staff are retained with stage wise increase in pay scales. Guest teachers on contract are permitted to take breaks to pursue higher studies or maternity leave.

• Industry Interaction

The Career Orientation and Placement Cell of the College organise career fests and recruitment drives by reputed firms to guide students in their choice of career options. In programmes where internship and on the job trainings are mandatory, students are sent to prestigious firms so that they will get positive exposure to their field of interest and better prospects for employment.

Ensuring Availability of Information for Review by Top Management and Stakeholders

The management and the Head of the institution review the activities of the institution through meetings with staff, staff council, reports of IQAC, and presentation of the reports of various activities by coordinators of the committees from time to time. Annual evaluation of these by IQAC is used to make necessary changes while planning the following year's activities. The Principal personally meets GRC members, class prefects, and student leaders at least once a month. Hostel Wardens' Council meetings help in matters concerning hostels. Meetings of the Alumnae Association and PTA as well as feedback from parents are utilized to assess the activities of the institution.

Management Support to Staff in Improving Effectiveness of Institutional Processes

The Management encourages the involvement of teachers through many ways. Faculty representatives are included in many of the managing bodies like Managing Board, Planning Board, Building Committee, staff selection committee, pastoral council, and other advisory bodies. The administrative abilities of teachers are utilized by appointing them as coordinators of unaided programmes, and various activities of the Community College. The management invests in human resource enhancement by encouraging teachers to participate in quality related programmes in the field of higher education. Staff are assigned charge of almost all activities for the effective and smooth running of the institution.

Resolutions made by the Management Council

A postgraduate course in Textiles and Fashion was launched under the Innovative Programme scheme of the UGC. Experts from the fashion industry have been employed on contract from Frankfurter School of Fashion, Germany, and Senior Expert Services, Germany to expose the students to technical expertise on an international level.

Further, as per the resolution of the Managing Board, 3 UG and one PG programme have been applied for and sanction from the State government is awaited. With a view to step up research activities, the college applied for funding under FIST programme from the Department of Science and Technology, and an amount of 67 lakhs was sanctioned. Four major projects were applied for and three have been sanctioned. Nineteen teachers are now pursuing research. To enhance extension and community oriented activities, an Incubation Centre is being launched at the Community College to facilitate local women who wish to start businesses of their own. Tie ups with the Federation of Indian Women Entrepreneurs, NGOs, Kerala Chamber of Commerce and Social Business Women (an organization of women entrepreneurs in Germany) have been initiated for this purpose. A number of

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environmental projects have been implemented in a bid to instill eco friendly attitudes in students.

Provision for According the Status of Autonomy

Though granting of autonomy to the College was strongly recommended by the NAAC peer team on its last visit, in the present scenario neither the University nor the State government has a policy of granting autonomy to affiliated institutions. So far no affiliated college has been granted autonomy by the State government. However, proposals have been sent in previous years to the **UGC** for this purpose.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism for Promoting Stakeholder Relationship

Common complaints of a general nature are brought to the attention of the Principal and these are promptly redressed. There is an effectively functioning GRC in the college for the redressal of student grievances which may also be conveyed through the Electoral College or Students' Union. Though suggestion boxes for teaching/non teaching staff are available, any grievances they may have are usually redressed individually, or through the associations of the respective groups. Feedback is received from parents and alumnae during open house and the meetings of the respective associations.

Court Cases in the Last Four Years

The College had filed a case for getting recognition as a Minority Institution and the case was ruled in our favour in 2011 by the Supreme Court. The College was also a party to the petition filed in 2010 for permission to conduct the elections to the Students' Union in the parliamentary mode.

Mechanism for Analyzing Student Feedback on Institutional Performance and the Outcome

Student feedback on institutional performance is received through the GRC as well as the annual feedback taken from student representatives by the IQAC. The former is taken up by the staff in charge of GRC and resolved. The latter is discussed with the Principal/in the Staff Council/IQAC and relevant steps are taken.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

Efforts to Enhance Professional Development of the Staff

The management encourages staff participation in Refresher and Orientation courses, seminars, conferences, workshops etc, both subject-related and general. In house orientation programmes are organized for newly appointed faculty. Funds available from the UGC for competence building initiatives are utilized to the maximum extent. All departments get full support for the conduct of academic seminars/conferences, and undertaking major and minor projects, exploring assistance available from outside agencies as well. The resources and facilities of the College are extended to all departments for

the conduct of the same. Linkages, collaborations and consultancy with NGOs and other agencies are encouraged. FDP is availed by the faculty. The non teaching staff of the college are delegated to attend training programmes to improve professional competency in their different fields such as income tax processing, pay roll software, scholarship processing, employee PF etc. Experts in these fields are invited over to train staff and clear their doubts. They are given training in the use of ICT in the college computer institute.

Strategies for Faculty Empowerment

Linkages, collaborations and consultancy with NGOs and other agencies are encouraged. FDP is availed by the faculty. Faculty of many departments are members of local, state, national and international professional associations. As a result of this, a number of programmes and contests of these associations are conducted in the college, involving staff and students.

Student evaluation of teachers is taken into consideration in arranging programmes for staff development. The Staff Association conducts orientation classes /seminars on topics such as neuro linguistics, clinical psychology, legal awareness, higher education policies etc. Annual retreats and renewal programmes are held.

The faculty are trained in computer and use of audiovisual aids. Staffs are motivated to continuously upgrade skills. All departments conduct academic seminars and expert lectures on current developments in their respective fields. External peer evaluations of the departments are conducted for objective assessment of needs of faculty development

Details on the Performance Appraisal System of the Staff

Staff appraisal is conducted by the evaluation wing of IQAC. Teachers' self appraisal and their appraisal by the Head of the Department, the Principal and the Manager are mandatory for promotion to higher grades of service. A detailed profile of each teacher, incorporating her involvement in academic, research and extension activities is maintained in the college office and updated at the end of every academic year. The potential of the faculty are identified and Principal assigns appropriate duties in the form of committees. The campus appraisal conducted by AMoCE incorporates evaluation regarding the quality of teaching-learning, administrative and support services. The Cell also collects semester-wise evaluation of individual teachers by students. Performance of staff is assessed by Principal by evaluating the Work diary, which includes monthly planner, time table, and workload. Each Teacher maintains a continuous evaluation register which records students' academic performance. The achievers among faculty are felicitated in the meeting of the Staff Association.

Review of Performance Appraisal Reports by Management and its Outcome

The Manager, Principal and Vice Principal as a team, visit all departments and receive feedback from teachers. They also evaluate the departments and give suggestions. The Principal conducts follow-up interface meetings with each department and informs the teachers of the action taken/decision reached regarding suggestions of both management and departments. Personal suggestions and advice are offered to individual teachers with regard to student feedback, if necessary.

Welfare Schemes for Staff

- Motivational lectures by experts in various fields
- Annual retreat and personal counseling
- College Health Club & Yoga Centre.
- Staff Co-operative Society provides numerous benefits for members, like loans, chitties, various deposit schemes, educational scholarships for children of members etc
- Day care center for children of staff.
- College bus facility to Kuttanad area
- Financial aid to non teaching/support staff by management & faculty
- Recreational activities conducted by staff association
- Residential facility
- Canteen/ Cafeteria
- Salary advanced for newly appointed teachers/substitutes in FIP vacancies
- Interest free loans
- Preference in admissions to any course for the children of teaching/ non teaching staff.

Measures taken by the Institution to Attract and Retain Eminent Faculty

Faculty vacancies are filled strictly as per UGC and university norms. Candidates are selected purely on the basis of merit. Priority is given to candidates actively pursuing research and continues to give them maximum support. At times, retired faculty are also retained as co-ordinators and guest faculty.

Pay scale of guest faculty is fixed on the basis of the subjects they handle, their qualification and skills. Competent faculty are retained with stage-wise salary increase and are encouraged to pursue higher qualifications.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Institutional Mechanism to Monitor Efficient use of Available Financial Resources

The College Managing Board and Planning Board are actively involved in the planning and monitoring of available financial resources. The College Bursar is in charge of maintaining accounts and the management of funds. When Government, UGC and management funds are available, the Staff Council is summoned to enquire of the needs of the various departments. The Heads of the departments submit their requirements and the funds are allocated upon the basis of these. The Building Committee of the College and Internal Manager for Infrastructure monitor major construction work in the College. The Systems Administrator is in charge of management and purchase of ICT resources.

Internal and External Audit

General internal audit is done by the bursar and audit of UGC funds is done by the IQAC and the UGC Action Council by using special software for annual accounting. The management and UGC accounts are audited annually by a qualified external agency. Government funds are also audited annually by the auditors from Higher Education Department as well as from the Government's Accounts General's office. The audited reports are presented before the College Managing Board as well as the administrative body of the Archdiocese (the agency which owns the College).

Details of Institutional Income and Expenditure

The major sources of institutional funding are the UGC, State government and income from self financing courses. A major portion of the last is utilized for payment of staff salary and establishment and maintenance of infrastructure/learning resources necessary for the self-financing programmes. In cases where UGC and Government funds are found to be insufficient, the Management funds are utilized. For the aided courses, the salary of the teaching and non teaching staff is met by the Government. The Management meets the expenses for the salary of additional support staff necessary for the smooth functioning of the College. Amounts cumulated over the years are utilized for purchase of land, construction and renovation of buildings and for providing support facilities/services for staff and students. For the year March 2011-12, a deficit of 15 lakhs was managed through bank loan.


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


During 2008-2013 an amount of Rs 34,00,000/- was sanctioned for the running of five Add on courses and in 2012, Rs 53,00,000/- was sanctioned as five year grant to the Department of Home Science for the newly introduced Innovative Programme MSc in Textiles and Fashion.

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Institutional Efforts to Secure and Utilize Additional Funding

The audit reports are sent punctually to the funding agencies so as to secure maximum additional funding. Sponsorships are solicited for seminars and competitions etc. The alumni, PTA and other benefactors contribute towards endowments, scholarships and student welfare schemes.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

Integrated Framework for Quality Assurance of Academic and Administrative Activities

The College management is keen to enhance and maintain quality in all spheres of the functioning of the college. The managing board is always constituted of eminent academics and administrators so that the best inputs for quality enhancement are received. A productive relationship is maintained with the stakeholders who contribute creative suggestions for quality improvement. Every effort is made to recruit the best available staff and the management appoints additional staff according to requirement to ensure smooth functioning of the College. Maximum available funds are procured from funding agencies, apart from those raised internally. All financial resources are utilized to improve student welfare mechanisms, as well as for enhancement and maintenance of infrastructure and learning resources. The campus is noted for its discipline and is free from party politics. There is sufficient hostel facility to accommodate all students who need it and accommodation in external hostels is not encouraged.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Institutionalizing of Quality Assurance Process

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell was formed as part of the Institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and it has ensured institutionalizing of the quality assurance processes. The IQAC was formed in 2001 soon after the first accreditation by NAAC in 1999. The IQAC consists of elected and nominated members including faculty, external representatives and guest members. The guest members are the Librarian, Bursar and student representative. All departments represented in the IQAC and this ensures participation and contributions from all quarters. The Cell takes the initiative in ensuring quality in academic and administrative activities. Its members visit premier institutes, participate in quality related seminars/workshops and make recommendations for the introduction of new and innovative academic programmes.

b. Decisions of the IQAC Approved

The IQAC suggests the thrust area of activity each year and a number of programmes are carried out focusing on the selected area.

- The college became a partner institute of IGNOU and started 10 courses under IGNOU, a PG course in Textiles and Fashion was started as Innovative Programme of the UGC. 5 Add on courses of the UGC, Remedial Coaching and coaching for competitive exams were also launched. A Student Amenities Centre, an Equal Opportunity Cell and infrastructure facilities for the differentially abled were recommended by the IQAC.
- o The IQAC conducts an annual campus evaluation on all the units of the college by collecting feedback from stakeholders. This feedback is used in formulating new policies annually. Under the initiative of the IQAC, the MBA students conducted a comprehensive evaluation of all departments in August 2012.
- Available UGC funds were recommended and allocated according to the requirements and requests of the various departments and ICT resources were enhanced through this
- A continuing evaluation to identify and reward talented students, CORALS (Core Group of Advanced Learners) is being carried out by the HRD department under the direction of the IQAC.
- o JET, an interdisciplinary journal was started by the Research Promotion Council, a wing of the IQAC.
- The IQAC invited management funded proposals for environmental projects from all the departments and students to make the campus eco friendly.
- For better college-community interface, the IQAC recommended that the Community College become a centre for Social Business and entrepreneurship by starting a Business Incubation Centre for sustainable development through empowerment of women.
- o To step up research activity in accordance with the Peer Team suggestion at the last accreditation, an Instrumentation Centre was set up for research and teaching in the science departments
- To improve efficiency in office administration the IQAC took the initiative to install new software.
- The IQAC conducts regular orientation sessions on academic and personal development for faculty
- The first International Seminar conducted by the College *Green Path to Sustainability: Prospects and Challenges* was organized by the IQAC in 2010.

c. External Members in IQAC and their Contributions

In the last five years, the IQAC has had three to four external experts from the academic and administrative fields. The external experts have acted

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as resource persons in orientation sessions and workshops for teachers to train them in SWOC, quality enhancement measures and research. They are also consulted in the implementation of innovative projects.

Student feedback on various aspects of the college is taken by the IQAC and the suggestions are taken into consideration and implemented whenever necessary. Free basic computer literacy, special menu in the College canteen on Thursdays, conduct of Arts day etc. were suggested by the Electoral College. The issues discussed in the annual alumnae meetings are also taken up in the IQAC.

The IQAC has representatives from all departments, library and the community college. Effective communication is also ensured by interaction between the IQAC and the Staff Council

Staff Training for Effective Implementation of Quality Assurance Procedures

The staff are given training in the use of advanced learning resources. Orientation sessions and training programmes are arranged for teachers on revised curriculum and evaluation methods, effective teaching and mentoring. Teachers take training in ICT when advanced modules are introduced. The administrative staff are trained at the college Computer institute in use of newly introduced software for administration. The Principal convenes staff council meetings to discuss the new programmes and procedures to be followed. A common checklist is intimated and the timeline for implementation is insisted upon. The Principal informs the teaching/administrative staff about the reforms in internal quality enhancement policies.

Academic Audit and its Outcome

Internal audit is conducted annually and the outcome is discussed in the IQAC and Staff Council meetings at the beginning of each year to make necessary changes and improvements. External audit by expert committees are conducted once in two years. The audit helps to identify areas for improvement and suggests ways to rectify them. The Exit Meetings and SWOC analysis done as part of the audit brings up valuable suggestions which are implemented at the departmental and institutional level, at the earliest. Increase the number of publications from departments, enhance research activities, improve spoken English skills of students etc were some of the suggestions acted upon.

Alignment of Internal Quality Assurance Mechanisms with the Requirements of External Quality Assurance Agencies

Since the College is an affiliated grant-in aid institution, it follows the quality requirements of the government as well as the university. The chief guidelines followed for quality assurance since the first accreditation has been those outlined by NAAC. Collaborations and tie up with national and

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government organizations as well as sponsorships and funding from UGC/other reputed agencies for academic, research and extension activities ensure that the quality standards of these bodies are maintained in the institution. The Research Promotion Council of the College takes the lead in this regard.

Mechanism for Review of Teaching-learning Process

The internal assessment schedules are given out at the beginning of each year. The Principal convenes Staff Council meetings regularly and necessary modifications are made in the academic calendar. Specific dates are stipulated for submission of internal mark sheets. Teaching plan and monthly academic plan prepared by individual teachers are recorded in their work diary and checked by the Head of the department and Principal. The Internal Examination Committee sees to it that the exams are conducted punctually and smoothly. The Heads of the Departments take the responsibility to make sure that the academic calendar is strictly adhered to by the staff and the syllabus is completed well in time.

Communication of Quality Assurance Policies, Mechanisms and Outcomes to Internal and External Stakeholders

The internal and external stakeholders contribute their suggestions in formulating the quality assurance policies through the college bodies and the outcome is intimated to them through newspapers, in the periodical meetings, departmental and general body meetings of the PTA and Alumni Association.

CRITERIA VII

INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1Environment Consciousness

Green Audit of the Campus

As a part of Greening the campus, awareness and action programmes are conducted. All departments have their own environment related projects which are designed and implemented by them. The department of Social Work has taken the initiative to conduct a green audit of the campus which includes a check list of the following criteria:

- Amount of waste generated and its disposal/recycling
- Water consumption in the campus
- Energy consumption in the campus
- Number of vehicles entering the premises
- Plant diversity in the campus

Initiatives for eco-friendly campus

• Energy Conservation and Use of Renewable Energy

The mission statement of Assumption College emphasizes training of students to contribute to the evolution and practice of sustainable development through eco friendly activities.

Solar lamps are being used as renewable energy sources in the campus and hostels. Our proposal for its funding from MP fund has been accepted. Staff and trained students conduct awareness programmes in the local neighbourhood and their specific communities about ways to reduce consumption of power and methods to utilize alternative energy sources. In support of 'labhaprabha', a comprehensive campaign organized by Kerala State Electricity Board, students of the department of Chemistry have registered in this venture by conducting an energy audit of their homes. In the campus, re-wiring of old electrical fittings and repairing and replacing of faulty plumbing are done promptly to avoid wastage of power and water. Food waste from the college canteen, students' mess hall, staff hostel in the campus and cow dung from the College hostels is utilized to produce biogas fuel for the College and hostel canteens. This process has helped to minimize waste and cut down on LPG consumption. The slurry obtained from the plant is utilized in the vegetable and flower gardens. Organic waste is used for the production of vermicompost. There are also pipe compost units in different parts of the College and hostel campuses. The hostels also rear pigs which consume the kitchen waste.

• Water Harvesting

A model project to harvest rainwater and to enrich groundwater was undertaken in collaboration with Changanacherry Social Service Society. It serves as a model to be followed by students in their communities as well as by other institutions.

• Efforts for Carbon Neutrality and Plantation

We collaborated with the State Forest Department to distribute saplings and plants to the staff and students. A medicinal plant garden was set up by the Botany Department and the plants were labeled. An exhibition and sale of medicinal plants funded by Central Ministry of Environment and Forests through the Centre for Environment and Development is held annually for the benefit of students and the public. A programme on National Environment Awareness Campaign on Biodiversity Conservation was also funded by it. Students undertook a study of the trees in the campus, labeling them with scientific names to create awareness of plant diversity. Important days such as World Environment Day, Wildlife Week and Ozone Week are observed in the College with a week-long series of expert lectures, competitions and poster displays.

A number of fast-growing trees were planted in the campus in the last few years. The NSS unit of the college took the initiative to set up a kitchen garden. Mushroom cultivation is practiced and promoted actively in the College by giving training and mushroom spawn to local women. Mushroom cultivation helps to reuse and recycle plant byproducts such as sawdust and paddy straw. Mushroom spent is used for the production of vermicompost. Organic farming is practised in the vegetable and flower gardens in the College and hostels in an attempt to replace chemical fertilizers and pesticides.

• Management of Hazardous Waste

The College aims to make the campus plastic-free by avoiding non-biodegradable products such as plastic glasses, cups, plates and straws in the college cafeteria and canteen and instructing students to avoid bringing plastic covers. The use of flex banners is also discouraged. Bins were placed in different parts of the campus for the segregation of plastic, paper and food waste. Students were given training in segregating biodegradable wastes such as food and paper and non-biodegradable waste such as plastic and glass. The College has also volunteered in being a collection point for plastic bottles and plastic covers.

Reuse: Reusable steel plates and glasses are used in the hostels, canteen and cafeteria. Usable old clothes are collected to be distributed to old-age homes, orphanages and care centers for the terminally ill. Old cloths are used for cleaning purposes in the College and hostels and students are encouraged to do

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the same at home. The college aims for an eco friendly campus and to make this a reality, the use of eco friendly bags and files are encouraged.

The College has tie up with various NGOs like Changanacherry Vikasana Samithi, CHASS and Jaycees as well as Changanacherry Municipality to clean and green the various roads in Changanacherry. The staff and students have taken the initiative to take up road cleaning and clean city programmes with the collaboration of these organizations. A survey was conducted by our students in the neighbouring wards to study their waste management measures and to give awareness on effective methods for the same. Students were trained to manufacture paper bags and a sale of the same was held. The Fashion Technology department puts up exhibition cum sale of eco friendly garments and accessories. The department of Economics sources eco-friendly bags from the manufacturers and make them available to staff and students at affordable prices.

e-waste Management

Every effort is made to repair and use electronic and electrical devices. Students are trained to adopt such measures in their homes. Piling up of e-waste is discouraged in the campus. Awareness campaigns were conducted in wards 31 and 32 of the Municipality, by students of Computer Science.

7.2 Innovations

Innovations which have Created a Positive Impact

Courses related to environment are chosen as elective options by many departments. A UGC sponsored certificate course in "Herbal Products for Health and Beauty" is offered in the College. The Botany department has also run short term modules on mushroom cultivation and eco friendly horticultural practices.

Visible reminders such as placards, posters and banners are placed in the campus for students to assimilate environmental values. Principal Dr Sr Mercy Nedumpuram, is the subject researcher for a video CD on environmental issues "Bhoomisangeerthanam". It has been screened in the College and distributed in educational institutions all over the state for the purpose of creating awareness on the environmental hazards of modern lifestyle. Many faculty members have publications on environmental issues; a handbook on eco friendly mushroom cultivation and a recipe booklet on mushroom dishes were brought out by the Botany Department. Booklets and CDs on special health diets/nutrition education are also brought out by Home Science department. One of the members on the non teaching staff has published a volume of poems in folk style reflecting contemporary concerns about the natural world.

A three-day flower show was organized in the College campus in collaboration with the Merchants Association of Changanassery and

interactive sessions on agriculture, apiculture, horticulture, maintenance of aquariums etc were conducted for students and the public. As part of their Public Relations programme the students of BA Communicative English conduct surveys in the neighbourhood on waste management methods.

Other Innovations

- The College chooses a thrust area of focus each year in keeping with the vision of the College and in tune with the higher education policies of the UGC and NAAC. All the activities of the College, co curricular and extra curricular, are designed to converge towards this thrust area.
- The Assumption Community College is a subsidiary wing of the College to centralize its extension activities. The Community College has established a Business Incubation Centre to train potential women entrepreneurs to start their own ventures. Assumption Fashion Boutique has been set up as the first step, which will be followed by incubation in other sectors such as organic farming, preparation of food preserves and tourism.
- The IQAC has a multi level screening process spread over six semesters to identify Core Group of Advanced Learners(CORALS) for the award of Best Outgoing Student. The screening includes evaluation of their academic performance, participation in extracurricular and extension activities, soft skills and communication skills, general awareness, leadership qualities etc. the CORALS group takes the lead in organizing student activities in the College.
- A Learning hour is designated outside regular class hours on a daily basis for students to take short term Add on Courses and Enrichment modules. In this way, students are able to acquire additional skills by the time they complete their academic programmes. All students are required to maintain a Learning Journal where they regularly and systematically record their participation in co curricular /extracurricular activities and achievements. The record is supervised and ratified by the mentor. The Learning Journal is evaluated before award of conduct certificates when they graduate. It also carries weightage for the award of Gold Medal for Best Outgoing Student.
- In response to the suggestion put forward by students a Student Amenity Centre was constructed to make provision for Indoor games like chess, carom, cards for day students. The Amenity Centre also has a rest room for students who come from a distance.
- In an effort to provide students with global exposure and practical training in international standards in garment construction, experts from **Senior Expert Services**, **Germany**, are engaged as visiting

faculty for a period of two to four months. German language classes are arranged for faculty and students of the department of Fashion Technology

- A microfinance saving scheme for staff and students-Samrudhi Planwas arranged through Changanacherry Social Service Society and 443 members have benefited from it.
- A Mathlab with a collection of mathematical models was set up by the Mathematics Department to develop and nurture mathematical skills of students and also to extend the resources to students from neighbouring schools

7.3 Best Practices

Best Practice I

1. Title of the practice: Assumption Community College for strengthening College-Community Interface

The vision of Assumption College is to create empowered and socially committed women. In order to achieve this end, the College has established Archbishop Powathil Assumption Community College (APACC). Higher education without employability and social commitment is futile. The College reaches out to the specific needs of the community through APACC. Women empowerment and Entrepreneurship promotion are the twin goals of this initiative.

2. Goal

The major goal of APACC is to sensitise the Assumption fraternity to its immediate community thereby making its existence more meaningful for the creation of a self- sufficient, self-reliant and sustainable community. It seeks to create an awareness of the dignity of womanhood and help students to develop an integrated personality. Besides, it helps to impart employability skills to the students as well as women in the neighbouring locality. The specific objectives are:

- i. To promote women empowerment for the overall welfare of the society.
- ii. To extend intellectual resources and infrastructure facilities of the College for the welfare of the community
- iii. To organise community resources and provide programmes to cater to the academic needs of the community.
- iv. To impart life coping skills, communication skills and administration work skills so as to promote the employability of its stakeholders.

- v. To conduct training programmes to meet the resource development of the students and people in the community.
- vi. To promote sustainable and harmonious coexistence of man and nature through management of natural resources
- vii. To foster healthy lifestyle in the student community
- viii. To accelerate socio economic development of the stakeholders through production and marketing of goods and services
- ix. To handhold and escort people in distress.
- x. To promote social projects

3. The Context

In order to achieve women empowerment, their economic empowerment is very essential. But the real challenge is enhancing their access to the job market by making them employable. Assumption Community College offers a range of skill development courses to its students as well as to women in the locality. In the era of globalisation and competition, entrepreneurial skills are very important. APACC provides training in entrepreneurship through incubation of entrepreneurial ventures.

4. The Practice

APACC has the following practices to achieve the goal of women empowerment and entrepreneurship promotion.

- i. Started skill development courses- Computer courses (Diploma and certificate), Tailoring, Fashion designing and Embroidery
- ii. Enrichment modules for college students (Jewellery Making, Hand Embroidery, Computer Fundamentals)
- iii. Training in fashion designing
- iv. AWAKE society for entrepreneurship promotion
- v. Akshaya Centre
- vi. Linkages and collaborations with Federation of Indian Women Entrepreneurs, TiE Kerala, Kerala Chamber of Commerce-Women' forum, and NABARD
- vii. Assumption Business Incubation Centre for giving handholding to young business ventures by women entrepreneurs.

Assumption College is a pioneer in establishing business incubation facilities in Kerala. Students can have training while doing their regular programmes so that they may start their own business enterprises after the completion of the course.

5. Evidence of Success

The programmes offered by the Assumption Community College are well appreciated by the students and the women in the locality. On an average 20 women from the neighbouring locality attend each skill development course every year. The Certificate and Diploma Courses offered by APACC are attended by students of various disciplines.

The Department of Fashion Technology serves as a resource centre for the Fashion Boutique started in the Community college. The students design the apparels and offer them for sale in the Boutique. This is a notable achievement in entrepreneurship development.

About of fifty of our alumnae members who are interested in starting/expanding their own enterprises have come forward to take training in entrepreneurship. They are given a comprehensive training in starting business ventures including ways to get funding from Government departments and NGOs. *Mattoli*-the women organization of Nitta Gelatin India Ltd, Kochi has been entrusted to our Business Incubation Centre to develop the entrepreneurship skills of its members. The Business Incubator, which concentrates on garment manufacture business, plans to diversify into other sectors such as agriculture, tourism, catering and food services.

'AWAKE' is a registered Charitable Society acting as an umbrella organization to coordinate all the entrepreneurial initiatives.

The Akshaya centre of APACC offers various services such as eliteracy, Comprehensive Health Insurance Scheme, Malayalam computing, epayment, on-line application processing, training in medical transcription and soft skills.

APACC has a Small Savings Scheme (Samrudhi Plan) for students in association with Changanacherry Social Service Society.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The major problems encountered are the following:

- i. Mobilizing local women for various training programmes
- ii. Lack of financial resources for widening the programme line
- iii. Lack of Infrastructure to expand the Incubation centre

Best Practice II

1. Title of the Practice: Value Based Education

In keeping with the vision and mission of the College, value based education is imparted to students to make them morally upright and socially committed. Various activities based on value education enable the students to promote sustainable development through eco friendly activities.

2. Goal

The major goal is to inculcate moral values in students to mould them to become socially responsible and committed citizens. The specific objectives are:

- i. To prepare students to be committed to a life of community service as active citizens
- ii. To impart humane values and social attributes to the students
- iii. Contribute to the betterment of the less privileged in the society
- iv. To equip students to practice sustainable and eco friendly lifestyle
- v. To develop philosophy of life

3. The Context

The present formal educational system does not provide avenues for students to live in harmony with society and to imbibe moral and spiritual values. Without social responsibility, education is not complete. In order to fill this void and to mould the students as socially committed citizens, the College encourages the students to engage in various activities that lead to their holistic development.

4. The Practice

To promote and strengthen values in our students for a better future, the following activities were conducted: regular religion and moral science classes, prayer meetings for teachers and students, monthly Holy Eucharistic Celebration and assembly in the College quadrangle, prayer at the beginning of every session, annual retreat/ spiritual animation programme/value education seminars, three day inter-collegiate camps, life guidance courses, premarital guidance course for outgoing students. The College also observes Communal Harmony Day to spread the message of communal harmony. Independence Day is also observed to promote national integrity. Regular Counseling programme for students and continuous mentoring programme by our former faculty members is also conducted.

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The College organizes a variety of programmes:

a. Green Initiatives

To raise public awareness about environmental protection and to create awareness among our students on conservation of natural resources, the College observes World Environment Day, Ozone Day and World Food Day. The international conference on "Green Path to Sustainability: Prospects and Challenges" gave a wide momentum to green thinking and green initiatives. This seminar provided a platform for the environmental scientists and activists to share their experience and scientific knowledge with the student community. Α documentary highlighting environmental Bhoomisankeerthanam, was prepared by our Principal. The students of fashion Technology Department organized exhibition on Eco-friendly jewellery in 2010-11. This helps students to promote eco fashion through use of Ayurvastra, Khadi, natural and other eco-friendly fabrics. Each department of the College takes up eco-projects on various environmental issues like waste management, rain water harvesting, groundwater recharging, paper bag production, conservation of biodiversity, biogas plant etc.

b. Women Empowerment

In view of Women Empowerment students are being trained in soft skills, through personality development workshops, coaching classes and interviews with eminent women activists. International Women's Day is observed with various activities on women issues like women's rights, gender equality and legal awareness programmes. MSW students introduced a new concept of Human Rights Tree. A 30 day campaign called *Jagrithi* on Women Security in contemporary scenario was conducted under the leadership of Women Cell.

c. Social Commitment

Charity has been taken up as an important activity by the college. One day is observed as mission day every year. Students and teachers actively participate in the mission day activities. Students put up food stalls and gaming zones in the college campus and hostels to collect funds. Students' Union in the college takes the leadership in collecting noon meal every Friday and is handed over to Puthujeevan Trust, an NGO based at Changanacherry. Students very enthusiastically participate in this noble venture. This collective action has brought about a passion and commitment among students to serve society. The members of the faculty contribute generously towards the charitable activities of the College. The College provides free food and accommodation facilities to financially weaker students. In 2009-10 each department selected a particular value- such as 'respect for the elderly', 'environmental awareness', 'sensitization on HIV'- for dissemination and a number of programmes were organized by them throughout the year for this purpose

5. Evidence of Success

The eco friendly practices initiated in the last few years have been institutionalised through the installation of biogas plants and solar appliances in the College and hostels, the use of biofertilizers and biopesticides, of biodegradable and non-biodegradable manufacture/distribution of paper and jute bags and collection of plastic covers/ bottles for recycling. The eco projects taken up by the departments and students such as water harvesting, waste water management, awareness programmes on environment and energy conservation, linking up with governmental and non-governmental agencies in 'clean green programmes' have instilled in students a concern for the environment. They enthusiastically carry out these practices in their households and neighbourhoods. The Environmental Award conferred on the College by the Khadi and Village Industries Board, New Delhi is a recognition of our efforts in creating awareness on environmental issues.

The institutional attempts at women empowerment through cocurricular and value added skill development/ HR programmes as well as internship opportunities have enabled our students to be more confident and empowered by the time they graduate from the Institution. An evidence of the success of our efforts is the substantial number of well placed alumnae in different walks of life. There are also a number of students who have achieved remarkable success as entrepreneurs. Our students have distinguished themselves in extension activities through their active involvement in NSS, NCC and Red Ribbon Club. University NSS awards for best college, best Programme Officer and best student volunteer, participation in RD parade and NCC/NSS national level camps, selection for international youth exchange programmes are proof of the meritorious performance of the College.

The value based education offered by the College ensures students' integral growth. Student leaders take the initiative in organizing fund raising for charitable causes. In the last five years Rs 10,00,000/- was raised by the students for charity. An amount of Rs 3,34,000/- was donated by the teaching staff and Rs 56,000/- by the non teaching staff to the family of a deceased member of the non teaching staff. A collection of Rs 2,46,000/- was contributed by the faculty for the *Diamond Jubilee Housing Scheme*, for the deserving and underprivileged students of the College in 2010-11. In 2013 the whole college joined hands to raise Rs 4, 00,000/- to construct a house for a needy student. In 2010-11, Rs 1,00,000/- was donated to a member of the non teaching staff for her husband's kidney transplantation and in 2013, Rs 75,000/- was given as a Christmas gift to the Kidney Foundation of India. We are proud of our alumnae who contribute to societal development and the wellbeing of women and the underprivileged in a number of ways. Every year the Distinguished Alumna Award is awarded taking into consideration their academic achievement, quality of family life, contribution towards the welfare of the underprivileged and their activities towards the betterment of society and women. The first recipient of the Award, Dr. Sr. Mary Litty, after her medical training in the UK, founded a congregation to devote herself fully to the care of differently abled children. For the last 32 years she has been rendering outstanding service in this field with whole hearted support from people within and outside the country. Another recipient of the same award, Mrs. R. Thankamony has been very active in politics to serve the needy in the society. She constructed a new road for the convenience of scheduled castes and other people of the Railway Rehabilitation Settlement. Considering her services in the field she was honoured by the Government of Kerala as the Best NSS Programme Officer.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The problems encountered are the following:

- Funds raised are insufficient to provide financial assistance to all the needy students in the campus.
- Lack of resources to meet the requirements of the Counselling Centre
- Erosion of values through the influence of media.

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POST REACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

Academics

There have been substantial improvements in various aspects of quality indicators of the College after the last accreditation by NAAC in 2007. The College celebrated its Diamond Jubilee in 2009-10 and five departments have celebrated their Golden Jubilee since 2007. UGC sponsored BFT and BA Museology & Archaeology, having completed the first five years, are now successfully continuing in the self-financing stream. The PG course in History, started in the unaided stream has been converted into an aided course. A new UGC Sponsored Innovative Programme in M Sc in Textiles and Fashion was started in 2012. The Research Centre attached to the History Department, sanctioned in 2007, now has 6 research guides and 5 research scholars. The Centre is now an approved centre for coursework for Ph D. The College became a Partner Institute of IGNOU in 2009 starting UG and PG courses in Commerce, Computer Applications, and Business Administration, in accordance with the suggestions put forward by the NAAC Peer Team in 2007. Some of the short term Enrichment modules offered by the departments were replaced according to student feedback and at present there are 18 modules. Five Career oriented UGC sponsored Add on courses were newly introduced after 2007. The Certificate course in Journalism and Mass Communication has continued into Diploma and Advanced Diploma levels; a Foundation Course in Human Rights, sponsored by the UGC, was introduced in 2011. APACC offers micro enterprise Development programmes of NABARD.

The College launched an annual multidisciplinary research journal, Journal of Experimental and Theoretical Research in 2010. The number of research projects, both major and minor, taken up by the faculty members has steadily increased. Two international and seven national seminars were organized in the last four years. Since 2007, seven members of the faculty have been awarded Ph D, five have acquired M Phil degree and four have submitted their doctoral thesis. The number of teachers pursuing research activities has increased considerably with seventeen new registrations, nineteen minor projects and seven major projects; among the new faculty appointments in the last three years, one has M Phil, four have Ph D and one has PDF. Out of seventy one permanent faculty members, 27% have PhD as their highest qualification, 38% have M Phil. Of the fifty one guest faculty, 4% have Ph D and 8% have M Phil. Twenty nine teachers have attended Refresher Courses, twenty have attended Orientation Courses and forty three have participated in subject related trainings. Thirty eight faculty members have been resource persons for various conferences/ institutions and the College offers consultancy services in twenty four areas. Eighty one international conferences and 322 national conferences were attended by the faculty members in the last five years. The number of paper presentations in

international conferences was 23, and in national conferences, 74; 35 international and 63 national publications were produced. A fund of Rs 67,00,000/- was sanctioned under the FIST Programme of DST to improve infrastructure for Teaching and Research in the Sciences. There has been a spectacular increase in the collaborations effected, with networking and linkages with 40 firms/institutions (as against 8 in 2007) as part of curriculum requirements/ research and extension.

Introduction of Choice Based Credit and Semester System for UG Programmes (2009-10) and Credit Semester System for PG programmes (2012-13) by the University offers academic flexibility in the choice of elective papers. In addition to the members in the Boards of Studies of Mahatma Gandhi University, five teachers are members of the BoS of other Universities. With the introduction of CBCSS, which involves the transition from marks to grading system, two internal examinations in the pattern of the external examinations are conducted annually for the whole college under the supervision of the Internal Examination Committee. To familiarize students with the question pattern and possible questions, CDs of question banks have been made available in the library by all departments. Since all UG programmes have computer related modules in their syllabus and to facilitate ICT enabled teaching-learning, specially designed computer literacy programme was given to all freshers at the college computer institute. German language classes are arranged for students and teachers of the Fashion Technology Department to facilitate curricular transaction for visiting faculty from Germany and to equip the department for the projected faculty/student exchange programme.

To ensure transparency in admissions and internal evaluation, merit lists in the management and community quota and grade sheets of internal assessment are uploaded in the website. In the University examinations in the last five years, we won 32 university ranks at the UG level, 10 at the PG level and two ranks (UG and PG) in the IGNOU programmes. In the CBCSS system, there have been 57 A+/A grades in two years. All departments have student projects and science departments have mandatory project presentations. Almost all departments have launched intercollegiate competitions to give students opportunities to interact and compete with their peers in other institutions. The number of expert lectures arranged by the departments to widen the intellectual horizon of the students has increased considerably. We became the third Arts and Science College in the University to organize INSPIRE Science camp funded by DST (2012), in which 160 students participated.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The post accreditation period has seen an enormous increase in infrastructure facilities for curricular and extra-curricular activities. The facilities added after the last accreditation include a new wing to house the

Research Centre in History, Assumption Heritage Museum, class rooms and a Seminar Hall. An indoor stadium, a separate hostel for PG students, a guest room and 2 guest residences, Student Amenity Centre with recreation facility and provision for indoor games, a well equipped DTP Centre and cafeteria are some of the other new introductions. The number of photostat machines, public telephones and televisions have increased, and an ATM counter was installed in the campus. Major renovations of all departments, laboratories, administrative offices, Auditorium, seminar hall, conference hall and Chapel have been undertaken. A transformer was installed exclusively for the campus in view of the expansion of the College. A college bus was purchased for the convenience of students from the rural Kuttanad area.

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More than 1000 books have been added to the general library each year, the number of journals in all disciplines has increased and all departments have set up department libraries. Much effort and expenditure have gone into the augmentation of ICT enabled learning resources. A commendable achievement in this regard is the LCD facilities (20 in number) in all the Departments. Under the NME-ICT scheme, internet connectivity is provided to all the hostels and the College. Wi-Fi, UGC funded Network Resource Centre, Smart Board, 2 Visualisers, 9 Laptops, large scale upgradation of computers, purchase of new software, Teleclassroom and Virtual Lab are some other important additions to the ICT facilities of the College. A Mathlab under the Mathematics Department, a project laboratory attached to the department of Physics and Research laboratory of the Zoology Department are new additions. Enhancement of infrastructure for sports and games include roofing and floodlighting of the Basketball Court, 3 lane 400m athletic track, and purchase of sports equipment worth Rs 6,00,000/-.

Student Support

Students are provided with adequate support system in the Campus. In the last few years Induction programmes were arranged for the newly admitted students to enable them to understand and assimilate the campus culture. The starting of a new department in Human Resource Development to offer softskills training to students and to coordinate the activities of the Career Orientation and Placement Cells is an innovation which has helped us to improve support services for students in a notable way. In 2008, the HRD department gave training in public speaking to advanced learners, with certification from Creek International. The Equal Opportunity Cell sanctioned by the UGC is found to be an efficient way to guarantee that students get all financial and other privileges that they are entitled to. The Assumption Welfare Cell takes a voluntary collection from students on each Friday, which is utilized to provide noon meal to needy students. UGC grants for Remedial Coaching have been availed of to give extra coaching to slow learners. Coaching for entry into services for SC/ST/ minorities were also started four years back. UGC funds were utilized for construction of special infrastructure such as chairs, ramps, rails and special toilets for differently abled students. CORALS is an initiative of the IQAC to encourage the advanced learners in the College. Wall magazine competition is conducted annually to encourage the creativity, general knowledge and innovativeness of students. Book exhibitions are organized in the campus every year to familiarize staff and students with the latest additions in their discipline. The Grievance Redressal Cell has redressed fourteen student grievances in the last five years. Student representation has also been included in bodies such as IQAC and library committee. In the last few years there has been increased student involvement in decisions pertaining to them.

The number of endowments for scholarships and cash prizes for students has been enhanced. A major step in this regard is the addition of 21 scholarships to the already existing ones.

Students' participation in Institutional Social Responsibility is reflected in the awards received for extension activities. Thirty one student projects/ surveys related to issues of social relevance were taken up, focusing on the community.

IQAC and Quality Enhancement Initiatives

The IQAC of the College has initiated a number of quality enhancing activities in the College. A State level seminar on *Quality Initiatives in Reaccredited Institutions* was organized and the Cell actively implemented and monitored the various quality initiatives. Software for admissions and utility software were installed for more efficient administration.

Presentation of the Action Plans of the departments for each academic year is conducted at year-beginning and internal as well as external academic audit of the Departments was conducted. Under the initiative of the IQAC, different committees were appointed to evaluate and submit reports on the overall activities of the College. The salary of guest faculty was enhanced with stage wise salary hike. Self-appraisal of teachers is collected every year to encourage an introspection of the effectiveness of their pedagogy and academic quality. Student feedback on academic programmes is collected to understand, assess and make changes in the design and delivery of teaching methods.

Innovative Practices

The thrust area identified by the College in 2010-11 was "Concern for the Environment". The activities taken up were continued through the following years and have become institutionalized. These include installation of biogas plant, training in ecofriendly agricultural practices, introduction of solar lamps, segregation of biodegradable and non biodegradable waste and awareness campaigns. A novel initiative of the IQAC in 2012-13 was to invite project proposals from all departments to make the campus more eco friendly. These management funded projects include manufacture/distribution of paper/

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jute bags, awareness camps and water harvesting plant. The College functions as a collection centre for plastic bags and bottles for recycling.

The Institution, in its efforts at women empowerment, has launched a Business Incubation Centre at the Community College to promote women entrepreneurship. We have effected a tie up with the Federation of Indian Women Entrepreneurs, New Delhi, for this purpose. Assumption Fashion Boutique was also started recently to aid women who wish to start enterprises in the garment sector.

As we evaluate our progress in the post reaccreditation period through the self study report, we are gratified that we have made a concerted effort to keep up with the fast changing developments in the higher education sector, while holding fast to our vision and mission.
